

All Oregon Congressmen Likely to Win

Angell-Wallace Contest May Be Only Close One In State's 4 Districts

SALEM, Oct. 31.—(P)—The nationwide trend toward the Republicans, which leaders of both parties admit is occurring while they differ as to the extent, won't disturb Oregon, whose four U. S. representatives are Republicans.

Oregon party leaders think the congressional race in Portland might be close, but the Democrats don't have much prospect of winning in the other three districts.

The Portland contest is between Rep. Homer D. Angell, dean of Oregon's congressional delegation who is after a fifth term; and Lew Wallace, Democratic National Committeeman and member of the State Senate.

Angell's platform, in line with those of the Republican National Committee, calls for free enterprise, a balanced budget, and an end to bureaucracy.

But Wallace says bluntly that Angell is an isolationist, and that he voted before the war against the draft, naval expansion, the repeal of the arms embargo, lend lease, and against many other things which Wallace claims were vital to prosecution of the war.

Angell says he is for the United Nations organization and full international cooperation.

Norblad Busy Campaigner

In the First Congressional district (Northwest Oregon), Rep. Walter Norblad, Astoria lawyer and war veteran who has served in Congress only since last January 11, is opposed by Lyman Ross, Washington County farmer.

Norblad has been campaigning harder than any other candidate in the state, making two and three speeches daily, even though he originally was elected in this overwhelmingly Republican district by a 2 to 1 margin. Ross has been active in public power legislation, having been one of the fathers of the state PUD law when he served in the State Senate.

Ellsworth's Task Easy

Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg editor now serving his second term, should have no trouble at all winning reelection, because his Fourth district (Southwest Oregon) is the most Republican of all. He, too, pledges curbs on federal spending and duplication of government activities.

His opponent is Dr. Louis A. Wood, economics professor at the University of Oregon. While the proposed Columbia Valley Authority is an explosive issue this year in Washington state, Dr. Wood is the only Oregon candidate who has said anything about it. He

wants the CVA to provide "integrated, regional control" for flood control, irrigation, power, recreation, and protection of fish and wildlife. He also wants more federal money for Oregon, particularly for the Willamette Valley project.

Stockman Record Target

In the Second district (Eastern Oregon), Rep. Lowell Stockman, Pendleton wheat rancher, wants a third term, and is opposed by Lamar Townsend, Klamath Falls attorney.

Stockman's platform is similar to that of the other Republican congressmen, while he also wants full development of Eastern Oregon's resources, including McNary Dam and other irrigation and flood control projects.

Townsend, supporting price controls public power and lower income taxes, takes Stockman to task for his voting record, including his votes against price control, authorization for UNRRA, and his votes for the Case Labor bill and to return the U. S. Employment Service to the states.

Air Ace's Widow Weds

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 31.—(P)—Marjorie Bong, 22, pretty widow of one of America's top flying aces, and James H. Baird, 22, sales manager for a woolen import firm, were married last night in a double ring ceremony. They met at a modeling agency last March, where both Mrs. Bong and Baird's sister were working.

Maj. Richard I. Bong, who was credited with shooting down 40 Jap planes, was killed Aug. 6, 1945, in a test plane crash here.

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PORTLAND, OREGON

Drys Sue Radio System on Charge Of Discrimination

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 31.—(P)—A \$33,063.048 suit seeking dissolution of the 168-station Columbia Broadcasting System was filed in Federal District Court here yesterday against CBS, five of its officials, the Schenley Distillery Corporation and Schenley Distillers, Inc.

The civil action was brought by Sam Morris, Dallas, Texas, evan-

gelist and active campaigner against the use of alcoholic beverages, and Henry M. Johnson, Louisville lawyer and president of the Kentucky Sunday School Association.

The petition accused Columbia of "unjust discrimination in not selling time for abstemious broadcasts by Sam Morris, the designated spokesman for the anti-liquor drinking forces." It alleged that requests for broadcast time had been made "repeatedly" and in each instance refused.

The petition said the broadcasting system, meanwhile, had shown "unlawful discrimination in favor of Schenley and its allies and the commercial beer and

wine interests" in selling them "the choicest radio time, on Columbia stations and network, to broadcast their appeals to drink beer and wine."

The suit, filed on behalf of "hundreds of thousands of citizens of a class," in Kentucky, "millions of citizens as a class residing in the United States," and "on behalf of the boys and girls," sought to impound \$18,000,000 of Columbia's surplus funds.

It sought judgment for \$15,063,048 to be placed in trust for use in broadcasts "in the public interest," including broadcasts counselling the non-drinking of

alcoholic beverages. It also asked that CBS be dissolved.
