Mrs. Lowell Russell of Roseburg will entertain at the Y. W. C. A. in Eugene on November 21, at which time she will feature the Indian sign language and sing in her native tongue, which is of the Kiowa Indian tribe, one of the plains tribes of Oklahoma. She recently sang for the Business and Professional Women's Club in Eugene and took part on a program of the Obsessions Club of that city.

Her Indian name is Kau-aunty, which means "Honking Goose." She is in great demand as an entertainer in Roseburg and has taken part in programs for various churches here and in the county as well as for numerous civic clubs and organizations. She is the guardian of the Cheshamway Camp Fire group composed of twenty girls.

SPECIAL MUSICAL PROGRAM TO BE HEARD SUNDAY NIGHT

A program of unusual quality will be presented by the First Methodist Church this Sunday night at 7:30 P. M. when two artists of especial ability combine their talents in a musical recital, it was announced today by the pastor, W. A. MacArthur. At the console of the great church organ will be Miss Kathryn Thut, new minister's assistant at First Methodist Church. Miss Thut graduated from Bluffton College, Bluffton, Ohio, in 1934 receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree, with a major in public school music. Her graduate recital was on the organ. She has done graduate study at Ohio State University School of Music, and also had training in choral conducting under the world-renowned composer and choral conductor, F. Melius Christensen at the Christiansen Choral School, Ferry Hall, Lake Forest, Illinois.

Miss Thut has been associated with church music, both as organist and choral director ever since her high school days, and hence is well qualified in the role of interpretation of sacred music on the organ. She has had considerable experience in the field of concert accompaniment, having acted as accompanist to the late Mr. John Galus Baumgartner of the faculty of the Westminster Choir School of Princeton University, in his concert appearances in Central Ohio.

Sharing honors in this recital program will be a very talented girl of the "younger set" in the person of Miss Marilyn Feller, daughter of Chaplain and Mrs. A. S. Feller, at the Veterans' Facility. Miss Feller has been singing in public since early childhood, doing much of her work in church music as one might well imagine a minister's daughter would. Following with her father in his several church responsibilities, she has held choir positions from coast to coast. Notable among her experiences in this regard is that of the opportunity she had in studying under Mr. Adams, voice coach and minister of music in the Lutheran Church of Atlantic City. While in Atlantic City, Miss Feller was a member of the Hospital Chorus, and appeared in a number of concerts in the various churches of the city.

A member, at present, of the Triple-Trio of the Roseburg High School, Miss Feller is a soprano of outstanding ability. It is a most refreshing thought to know that these two splendid persons are "our very own" living and working here in our own community. It is hoped that a very large attendance will be noted to express appreciation of these gifted musicians. The public is cordially invited and urged to attend.
