Three Roseburg Grid Teams Dated Away From Home

Football journeys away from Roseburg this week as the Warriors and Indians meet the two Grants Pass high school eleven on the southern city's grounds and the Papooses play their season's finale at Springfield. The Chiefs, commercial grid club, remain idle in preparation for the Armistice tilt on Finlay Field with the Willamette University junior varsity.

The Indians, fresh from an inspiring 46-7 win over a heavier Ashland club last Friday night, vie this coming Friday, November 8, on Grants Pass' turf in an annual clash for Southern Oregon gridiron prestige. The game will be preceded by a return tilt between Roseburg's sophomores and the Cavemen Sophs Thursday evening also at Grants Pass.

The Warriors won over Grants Pass on Finlay Field last week, 13-12, in a last minute thriller, and, like the upperclassmen Indians, hold an undefeated record, having beaten the Springfield Sophs, 13-0.

Mel Ingram's Indians' annual contest with the Cavemen may have a telling effect on the Indians' state playoff possibilities. Another high scoring victory would aid greatly in determining the final playoff teams.

The Indians have rolled up 229 points in six wins and one tie in seven starts this season. They have had only 29 points scored against them. The Cavemen, boasting the strongest club in the state's state playoff possibilities, played and tied three, Roseburg's last win over the southerners was in 1931, when the locals edged a 26-20 victory, although in 1941 they battled to a scoreless tie.

For the Roseburg Junior High Papooses, Saturday's contest at Springfield will be the finale of a very successful season. "Hod" Turner's Blue and Golds garnered a 33-0 victory over the Miller Frosh in their first tilt this season. A repeated win at Springfield will make their four-game season stand at three wins and one loss, having dropped last Thursday's contest to a heavier Grants Pass club, 7-0.

The Roseburg Chiefs, previously scheduled to vie with the Portland University junior varsity yesterday at the Rose City, were hit by a flu epidemic last week. They are now concentrating on their Armistice Day meet at Finlay Field with the strong Willamette University junior varsity.

The Chiefs dropped their first game of the season to Southern Oregon College, 32-6.
