Douglas County taxpayers served notice in Tuesday's election that they have enough taxes and do not propose to add to their burden. With but one exception—the Basic School Support bill—the sentiment of voters was most clearly expressed. They smothered proposals for additional taxes under an avalanche of votes.

The decision handed down by our highest court of appeal—the voters—is quite plain in Oregon, it would seem from a study of Tuesday's election results. A mandate has been given our legislature to revise our tax system and replace the present patchwork structure with something modern.

Tuesday was a great day for the Republicans! The G. O. P. landslide in the national election was, in effect, a revolution—American style. It was not fought with guns, nor bombs, but it was just as effective in ousting an unpopular form of government as the more drastic practices in some other nations, where murder, assassinations, rioting and bloodshed accomplish the same results which voters in this nation obtain by marking crosses with pencils.

If, on the other hand, the Republican party will adopt a realistic attitude, offering sound plans for resolving the chaos and confusion by which the nation has been gripped for so many years, its return to power probably will be extended many years.

Returns came slowly but surely. Counting the long ballot took much time in the larger precincts, and the News-Review tabulation crew labored throughout the night.
