Snell, Farrell, Kimsey Given Big Majorities in Douglas

Oregon's incumbent state officer—Governor Earl Snell, Secretary of State Robert Farrell, and Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey received most decisive approval from Douglas County voters participating in Tuesday's election. Snell and Farrell each received better than 3 to 1 majorities in the unofficial tabulation from 45 of Douglas County's 49 precincts. In the unofficial count compiled by the News-Review, precinct votes were as follows:

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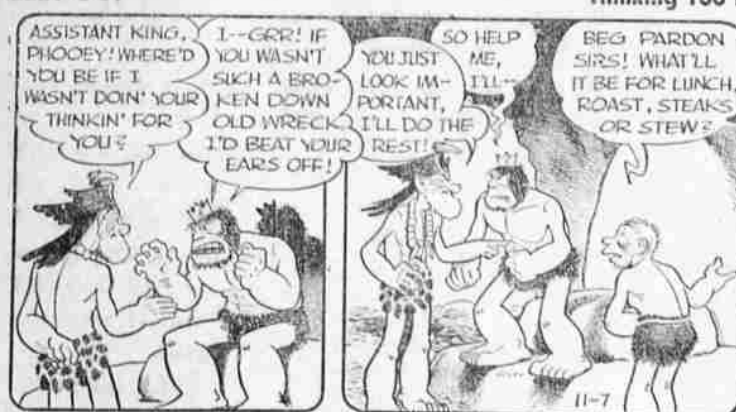
