

Drug Found That Kills Sheep Worm

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The Agriculture Department is cleaning up a job that has needed doing for more than 2,000 years.

"If we never accomplish another thing," Dr. Benjamin Schwartz of the animal industry bureau said, "we will have earned our pay."

He was speaking of the stomach worm that infects sheep. The bureau has discovered what its scientists believe is the perfect drug for eradicating the worms. The worm, which can kill sheep, develops from a parasite.

Dr. Schwartz said. Before the war, researchers were working with the drug which now appears to be the answer to their problem.

However, the drug also was needed for the manufacture of explosives. It acts as a stabilizer, and supplies were limited. The worm has been known for its evil deeds since Aristotle's time, and that philosopher, who was also a scientist, was born in 384 B. C. The worm has been causing trouble at least that long, and Dr. Schwartz doesn't know how much longer.

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Fish Bill Gets 3-1 Approval In Douglas; Pension Tax Loses, School Bill Verdict in Doubt

Decisive votes were cast Tuesday by Douglas County voters on the Coastal Streams Fish Bill, approved by a vote of more than 3 to 1, and the Little Townsend Pension Bill, defeated by a ratio of 2 to 1, on the basis of unofficial returns from 45 of the county's 49 precincts.

The same precincts gave a very slight majority for the Basic School Support Bill, with the result in doubt pending final returns. Precinct votes on the three measures were as follows:

Roseburg Chapter Of Hi-Y Enrolls 8 New Members

Eight new members were inducted into the Roseburg chapter of the National Hi-Y organization at last night's ceremonies at the Christian Church before members and parents. The local chapter now has a membership of 30 boys of ages 15 to 18. The program was directed by local chapter advisor Alva Laws, Roseburg High School faculty member, and Hi-Y president, Donald Kellogg, Hi-Y "Pupils' Behavior," to be led by Kenneth Knox, Shirley Woods was the organist during the ceremonies as the following boys went through the official Hi-Y induction ceremony: Arlen Sanders, Robert Roach, Kellogg Holiday, Dale McFarland, Robert Willhite, Archie Croucher, Rod Newland and Bill Madison. The ceremonies were closed with a prayer by the organization's chaplain, Donald Gibbs.

Organized in 1941 by Mr. Laws and Clyde Beard, former local high school principal, through a petition drawn up by local boys, the Roseburg boys organization is now making plans for its annual project of securing Christmas trees for local churches and schools.

Their last major project was a paper drive which proved very successful, collecting 51,520 pounds of waste paper. Receipts brought into the chapter from these drives will be used in sending local representatives to the Hi-Y national convention which is expected to be revived next year following wartime discontinuance.

Advisory Laws states that another similar paper drive is to be held by the boys in January.

Roseburg Teachers Dated at Workshop Institute, Eugene

Roseburg Senior High School students begin a five-day leave from classes beginning tonight as all senior high faculty members in Douglas County attend the Tri-County High School Workshop Institute in Eugene Thursday and Friday this week. All city school will observe Monday, Armistice Day, as a holiday.

The Tri-County High School Workshop, which includes high school faculty members of Coos, Lane and Douglas County schools, will hold their two-day workshop at the Eugene High School. Many prominent educational leaders in their respective fields are slated to head the 13-workshop sections. Local teachers holding positions as chairman of their respective sections at the meet are Homer Grow, agriculture; Paul Elliott, guidance; Frank France, industrial arts; Glenn R. Brady, biological science.

The theme of the meet is "Improving Education in the Secondary Schools," and will provide the starting point for workshop sectional meeting discussions Thursday. Other discussions on tap for the opening day are "Directing Pupils' Behavior," to be led by George Orr, superintendent of the Lincoln County School District, and "Guidance Procedures for Classroom Teachers," to be the subject of Stanley Williamson, associate professor of education at Oregon State College.

At a banquet at the Eugene Hotel Thursday evening, Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon College of Education, will

speaking on "What's New in Science."

Friday's program includes an educational topic by Hugh R. Wood, University of Oregon; professor of education, "Improvement of Pupil Evaluation," and "Utilization of Community Resources," by Lloyd Millhollen, principal of University High School, Eugene.

Roseburg High School teachers, City School Superintendent Paul S. Elliott said Tuesday, will be represented at this education session 100 per cent.

Salem Pioneer Dies

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Miss Sally Bush, 86, member of a prominent Oregon pioneer family, died at her home here Sunday.

She was born in Salem Oct. 29, 1880, and was the daughter of Asahel Bush, pioneer Salem banker who founded the Oregon Statesman, second oldest newspaper in Oregon.

She leaves a brother, A. N. Bush, president of the Pioneer Trust Company and former president of the Ladd and Bush bank; and a nephew, Stuart Bush of Salem.

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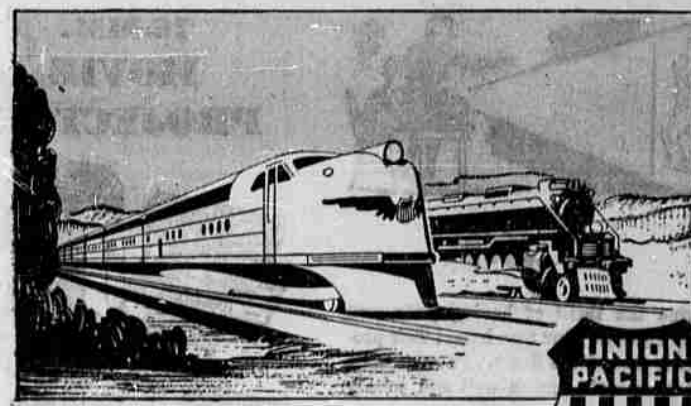
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
