Election returns from eight Douglas county cities and towns were reported to the News-Review today by the city recorders. The results follow:

DRAIN

Sherman Chapman was elected mayor for the coming two years by 56 votes. Also in the running were H. A. Cool, 36; H. L. Goodman, 54; and H. A. Woolman, 35.

Art Huckins, with 121 votes, was elected to the city council for four years; D. W. Brookhart and C. G. La Grander each received 120 votes, and Dennis Lovelace received 101 votes for a two-year term. The two receiving the highest number of votes were to be elected for four years; the two next highest for two years. Others in the running for city council were W. G. Cool, Jr., 56; R. F. Randall and Jim S. Whipple, each 80.

L. C. Applegate, with 163, was elected city recorder and Wayne Olson, 159, city treasurer, each for two years.

YONCALLA

Sidney Lasswell was elected mayor. Jean Cowan and Homer Kruse were elected to the council for four years, Charles Vian for two years, C. E. Hanan, recorder, Mrs. Kittie Jobe, treasurer, and Walter Lunny, were each elected to their respective positions for two years.

SUTHERLIN

Henry Cook was reelected mayor with a total of 185 votes, 134 in the east precinct and 51 in the west. William A. Crowell was reelected city recorder with 189 votes, 140 in the east precinct, 49 in the west, and C. P. Smith was reelected city treasurer with 189 votes, 140 and 49 in the two precincts.

RIDDLE

W. E. Love was elected mayor with 57 votes. Alfred Howard received one write-in vote for the office. F. L. Kummer was reelected city recorder with 55 votes, while Mrs. Gene Townsend and C. H. Davis, each received one vote. M. Townsend was elected treasurer with 54 votes, while Bill Mellor received one.

In the council race, V. R. Powell received 46; Ernie J. Van Doren, 43; Clyde Harrison, 39, and Guy R. Townsend, 28. They will serve four-year terms.

CANYONVILLE

W. W. Willis, with 61 votes, was elected mayor. His opponent, Bill Cox, received 39. H. J. Hash was elected recorder with 96; Leila Hamlin, treasurer, 94; Glen Gilmore, 60; A. R. Republicans Prepare To Draft Program

Truman should call a special "Lame Duck" session of Congress was brushed off by Rep. Sparkman (D-Ala.) who is high in Democratic councils.

The Alabamian, a senator-elect, said of this proposal from Reps. Boykin (D-Ala.) and Rankin (D-Miss.).

"I don't see that anything could be accomplished. The Congress which convened last spring would not enact the President's program and I can't see that it would do it as a Lame Duck Congress."

Mr. Truman himself kept silent publicly on the crushing defeat his party suffered in the elections and there were indications he would say nothing before next week at the earliest.

Republican planning will get down to an official basis a week from today when the House Steering Committee meets here on call of Rep. Joseph W. Martin of Massachusetts, the present minority leader who is expected to become speaker.

Tax Slash Promised

Individual Republicans already were busy framing projects. From Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.), slated to become chairman of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, came a declaration that individual income taxes will be slashed 20 per cent.

That and promises of a balanced budget brought this report from the present committee chairman, Rep. Doughton (D-N. C.).

"The Republicans have promised more than they can ever accomplish. They have promised to lower taxes and to balance the budget, and now that they have the opportunity, we will see just how they do it."

Senator Chavez Wins Out

In the election itself, late returns brought victory for Senator Dennis Chavez (D.) in his reelection contest with Patrick Hurley (R.) in New Mexico. The latest totals gave Chavez a lead of 67,332 to 62,142.

This raised the assured Democratic strength in the Senate to 43 with the Republicans sure of 51. Democrats continued to lead in the unsettled West Virginia and Maryland contests.

For the House, the party line-up stood Republicans 246, Democrats 196, and American-Labor one with two contests still inconclusive.

Political analysts, assessing the situation ordained by the American voters, saw President Truman confronted with the necessity of choosing soon on a political course.

Truman Faces Decisions

Mr. Truman apparently must decide: 1. Whether he still compromise with the Republican dominated Congress on controversial domestic and foreign issues, or challenge it and fight back with Democratic-supported voters.

2. Whether he shall attempt to lead his own party back toward the more conservative line that appeared to be popularized by Tuesday's sweeping GOP victories or steer it even more forcefully toward the opposite side of center.

3. Whether he shall attempt to rally dispersed Democratic forces around himself as a candidate for reelection in 1948 or prepare to step aside then for some other nominee.
