

Gray Ladies Need Volunteers for Vets Aid Service

An "increasing need" for more volunteers from this community to carry on the many types of services provided for veterans in the Roseburg Veterans hospital, was reported today by Miss Ada Keyes, Red Cross field director, who recently returned from a four-day conference for field directors of Pacific area veterans hospitals in San Francisco.

Miss Keyes conferred with Miss Mary B. Settle, national director of services in veterans hospitals; Mrs. Joan Jones, Pacific area director, and with field directors from 15 other Veterans Administration hospitals in the seven western states, on the most effective ways in which the American Red Cross can help "to bring the wounded veteran to the community and the community to the veteran."

Announcing that patients in veterans hospitals are "increasing steadily" and the peak load will not be reached for "at least another 20 years," Miss Settle stressed the need for volunteers to serve as Gray Ladies (hospital and recreation corps) and as motor corps workers, production workers, and skills workers and in other corps all of which are as busy today as they were at the height of hostilities.

Miss Settle added that women should remember that the men now in veterans hospitals are the same men they assisted during the war at Army and Navy hospitals. They need more aid, now that the war with its accompanying glamour and hero worship is over, she said, warning that "every effort must be made to keep these men from being institutionalized."

An appeal is also being issued for more men, who can help organize smokers and sports discussions with the veterans and for young people, especially college age volunteers.

Locally, the greatest need is for Gray Ladies, according to Miss Keyes. Information on how these wounded men may be helped can be obtained at the Douglas County Red Cross chapter, in the Roseburg Armory, telephone 832.

Sugar Robinson Kayos Levine in Tenth Round

CLEVELAND, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson, king of the welters although he doesn't wear the official crown, today had a sore hand, an aching jaw, something more than \$12,500, and his 49th kavo victory in 75 professional fights.

He picked up all those items last night as he flattened Artie Levine, Brooklyn middleweight, in the 10th round at the arena before a crowd of 12,102 which paid Ohio's greatest indoor fistic gate of \$83,171.98.

The New York Negro fighting

machine won this one the hard way. He dug himself out of the rain after being floored for a nine count in the fourth stanza by a rapier-like left hook to the jaw, weathered a couple of other flurries and then battered his foe into helplessness with only 19 seconds to go.

It was Levine's first knockout defeat in 60 professional bouts.

Sen. Fulbright Declares Truman Should Resign

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 7.—(AP)—U. S. Senator J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) said yesterday that since the Republicans have captured both houses of congress, "President Truman should appoint a Republican secretary of state and resign from office."

Fulbright said flatly "It probably would be the wisest thing for the President to do."

The Democratic Senator from Arkansas added: "I am not asking the President to resign. I am only suggesting that it would be the best thing for the country as a whole."

Fulbright told a reporter that he mentioned to friends at a private gathering early this week in Washington that he planned to introduce a constitutional amendment which would permit Congress to authorize a new election for President if the legislative and executive bodies are controlled by two parties.

"We have had such a situation occur about 27 times since the nation was founded," he said.

"If President Truman resigns it will place the responsibility of running the government on one party and prevent a stalemate, as is likely to occur."

"By appointing a Republican secretary of state and then resigning, he will be acting in a perfectly legal, constitutional manner. The constitution provides for the secretary of state to succeed the President when there is no vice president."

In Washington, no comment on the Fulbright suggestion was forthcoming from the White House.

Farm Brevities

Spraying 2, 4-D to control bindweed and Canada thistle has been approved under the 1947 Agricultural Conservation Program. It will not qualify for practice payments in 1946 because weed control measures under the current year's program have been established since the first of the year.

Department of Agriculture scientists have reported that cattle and sheep grazed on pasture treated with 2, 4-D reveal no unusual effects from the herbicide. They point out, however, that their experiments have been conducted with pure 2, 4-D, and warn that commercial 2, 4-D preparations could contain impurities and other ingredients which might have toxic effects.

Annual Magazine Sale Launched By Jr. High Students

Roseburg Junior High School's 10th annual magazine subscription drive, opened last Friday, closed Wednesday, November 13, Romaine R. Brand, principal, reported Tuesday. The all-student drive this year is directed toward funds for improvement of the school's auditorium stage.

Netting \$958 at the close of the evening day of the subscription drive, this year's quota has been set at \$2,500. In case a super-quota of \$3,000 is successfully reached, Mr. Brand stated, the extra funds will be used for financing class parties.

With the school retaining generous portions of subscription commissions and participating student solicitors earning merchandise awards, Mr. Brand stressed the value of this community drive of the student body in the fact that commission earnings remain in Roseburg, rather than going to the magazine company solicitors.

Five magazines of the Curtis Publishing Company are included in the subscription and renewal plan, along with 44 other cooperating national magazine agencies.

Receipts of this year's project, the tenth successful drive of the local Junior High School, is directed toward funds for new stage drapes, permanent speaker and improved lighting equipment.

Projects obtained through previous drives include the present stage curtain, the school's public address system, an electric score board in the gymnasium, considerable athletic equipment, and a radio-recording machine.
