SPECIAL CONFERENCE HELD AT EUGENE

Dr. Emma Gene Nevin, health chairman of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women was the main speaker at the banquet held in her honor at the Eugene Hotel at Eugene, Ore., last Friday evening. Since this banquet was also in observance of National Health and Safety Week, it was very fortunate that Dr. Nevin could speak. She is most ably qualified to speak on that topic since she is actively connected with the Red Cross in Washington, D. C., and on the National Council on Safety. A gifted and talented speaker, Dr. Nevin elaborated on these facts: "In the capacity of safety council she said that most of the accidents costing lives were avoidable accidents in the home and on the highways are usually caused by thoughtlessness and by the attitude 'It shouldn't be done but I'm sure I can do it just this once again without consequences.' That many people were apparently reckless because they 'didn't dare to be cautious' because others thought them 'cowardly cautious.' People didn't didn't dare to hold back the car honking behind them, they'd rather go through the changing sign. They didn't dare to stay home from an engagement when the weather was unsafe for an airplane ride."

She gave many interesting phases on old stable rules of health, one was the important habit of eating: "We are what we eat." A diet that always starts next week is an example of our typical neglect. One basic rule of health was amusingly put: "The more hours spent with Nod, the less spent under the sod." Dr. Nevin said most people would manage to go to a doctor for a check-up when they didn't feel up to par, but they usually left it at that, if simple remedial measures were suggested, the patient usually kept putting off using the initiative to follow instructions until something drastic had to be done, then mourned the consequence.

Edna E. Helgeson of the Roseburg club enjoyed attending this delightful banquet and evening's entertainment. Evalu Russell, talented singer of the local club, sang two charming numbers for the entertainment of the large gathering.

Price and Wage Decontrol Pace Not to Slacken

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8. — (AP) — A top government official said yesterday there will be no slackening of price and wage decontrol in the wake of the administration's election debacle.

Even as OPA posted higher prices for many infants' and children's cotton garments and some other clothing items, this official told a reporter "the chances are better than 50-50" that price controls on all wearing apparel and textiles will be removed "very soon."

This action may be taken when OPA's so-called master decontrol list is announced, possibly this weekend. Elimination of price ceilings on clothing and textiles automatically would free these industries of wage controls.

"Both price and wage decontrol will continue to be speeded up all along the line as outlined by President Truman when he announced the end of meat ceilings," a high official said.

He added that heads of government agencies concerned have been holding conferences to determine whether such items as automobiles and basic commodities like coal, building materials, steel and other metals should be freed of controls at this time. "We may have to keep controls on in those fields for a while, but the whole matter still is wide open," the official said. "It would be difficult to hold prices there while virtually every-

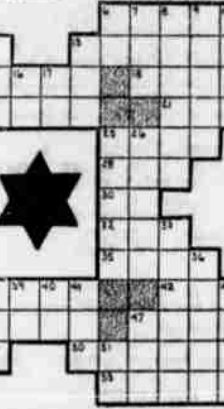

thing else is decontrolled."

The official added that much consideration is being given to contractors' contentions that the veterans' housing program would move along faster if building materials were decontrolled. Housing Administrator Wilson Wyatt has opposed removing these ceilings.

Tied to the forthcoming announcement of OPA's decontrol list will be the administration's decision what to do about the wage stabilization board.

OPA said that many cotton

garments for infants and children will cost from 10 to 15 percent more, while men's individually packaged handkerchiefs will go up by 25 percent.

The agency said this will result from allowing manufacturers to add increases in labor and material costs to their present ceilings.

A smaller increase in low-cost men's tailored clothing was predicted by OPA as the result of an order permitting manufacturers to include in their ceilings a recent 10 percent price rise for certain woolen and worsted fabrics. Officials said the result would be retail prices 3 or 4 percent higher.
