Reckless Driver Draws \$500 Fine, 6 Months in Jail

REEDSPORT—Paul Wellborne, 18, Houser, Ore., was charged with reckless driving in justice court here, after he reportedly led officers in a 75-mile-an-hour chase on the Coast Highway last week.

Young Wellborne, who recently moved with his parents from Portland to Houser, had established an automobile machine shop in which he apparently re-built old wrecks into "hot" or speed cars. He admitted at the hearing that he is adept at "putting speed into motors."

Justice of the Peace Fred M. Wright fined him \$500 on the charge and sentenced him to serve six months in the county jail. On a second charge of larceny of automobile parts, he was bound over to the grand jury.

Wellborne was previously convicted of reckless driving in Multnomah County, the court advised.

Frank Worthington, Winchester Bay, entering a plea of guilty to trapping fur-bearing animals during the closed season, was fined \$25. George Prescott was fined \$25 for hunting without a license and Madison Wilson, Seattle, was fined \$35 for reckless driving.

Contest on for Presidency of Oregon's Senate

PORTLAND, Nov. 12—(AP)—State Senators Earl T. Newberry of Medford and William W. Walsh of Coos Bay reported today they had consolidated their pledges for the Oregon Senate presidency against the candidacy of Senator Marshall Cornett of Klamath Falls.

The announcement came as senators regrouped here after a series of week-end conferences in which the efforts of Cornett gained impetus when a group of six Northwest Oregon senators

allied themselves behind the Klamath County man.

Neither Newberry nor Walsh would say which of the two would step aside in favor of the other in their campaigns for the presidency of the upper chamber. They claimed 15 pledges and said they believed they could depend on several others.

Cornett has not made any statement on the number of pledges he holds, but was reported to be in Eastern Oregon late yesterday trying to line up additional support.

The Senate post requires 16 of the 30 senatorial votes. The position carries with it the succession to the governorship in the event the governor dies.

In the campaign for speaker of the house, Rep. John H. Hall, Multnomah County, declared here he holds enough pledges to take over that office.

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Mixing Bowl Magic by Mary Mills

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"MAKE FRUIT CAKE NOW," says Mary Mills

Mary Mills' Dark Fruit Cake, shown here is wonderful to serve when guests drop in during the holidays. As fruit cake improves with age—it is none too soon to make it now.

Recipe below makes 1 loaves 7x3x2 inches or 4 loaves 8x4x3 inches



DARK FRUIT CAKE

- 1 lb. Seeded Raisins
- 1 lb. Currants
- 1 lb. Candied Orange Peel
- 1 lb. Citron
- 1 lb. Candied Pineapple
- 1 lb. Candied Cherries
- 2 cups Ground Apples
- 1 cup Shortening or 2 cups Brown Sugar
- 2 Eggs (about 2 cups)
- 2 cups Molasses
- 3 cups FISHER'S BLEND FLOUR
- 1 1/2 tsp. Salt
- 2 cups Soda
- 1 cup Cloves
- 1 cup Mace
- 1 tsp. Nutmeg
- 1 cup Hot Strong Coffee
- 1 cup Tart Fruit Juice

Use a combination of white and dark raisins, if desired. Slice candied fruit finely—use 1 lb. prepared fruit mix. Grind apples or use applesauce. Combine fruits thoroughly.

Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Beat eggs until thick and add to creamed mixture. Add molasses. Sift and measure Fisher's Blend Flour. For darker-colored cake, brown half the flour in slow oven, being careful not to burn. Sift flour with salt, baking powder, soda, and spices. Add flour mixture alternately with coffee and fruit juice to shortening mixture, stirring well after each addition. Add fruit and mix well. Bake in loaf pans lined with heavy (unwaxed) paper. Unbaked paper is extra-heavy, use double thickness. Grease both paper and pans. Fill paper to top of pans. Fill pans nearly full with batter. Bake at 275° F. 2 to 3 hours, depending upon size. Let cool in pans 1 minute. Then remove cakes from pans but leave in paper. When cakes are thoroughly cool, wrap well in waxed paper and store in tin box. Moisture increases and flavor improves on storing.
