Gray Ladies Ask For Enrollments

Applications will be received by the Red Cross for membership in a Gray Ladies corps to serve in the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, it was announced today by Mrs. Arthur Clarke, executive secretary of the Douglas County Chapter.

On duty, the Gray Ladies will wear the uniform which gives the corps its name. Typical services rendered by the Gray Ladies are acting as hostesses in the recreation room, visiting patients in their wards, assisting with library work, distributing Red Cross supplies, writing letters for patients' signatures, shopping for patients, assisting with entertainments, playing or teaching games.

Business women lacking sufficient time to devote during the day will be able to fulfill the required hours during evenings, Sundays, and holidays. Any women wishing to enroll in this service may do so by calling at the Douglas County Red Cross chapter offices in the Roseburg Armory, or by telephoning No. 832, Mrs. Clarke said.

The Gray Ladies corps was first established in 1918 at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, D. C., in answer to the need for outside contacts for hospitalized service men.

Under the best of circumstances, it was recently stated by Dr. Daniel Blain, assistant medical director for neuropsychiatric service, Department of Medicine, Veterans Administration, the hospital's medical staff reminds a man that he is ill. Volunteers of the Gray Ladies, representing a cross section of the population, have a definite counteracting value.

Women accepted into the corps will be given a special course of lectures by the hospital staff so that they may better understand the problems of the hospitalized veteran.

Demise of OPA and the release of price controls also presumably means the end of the Roseburg price panel, said its chairman, Richard McElligott, today.

However, no instructions have been received from OPA regarding the various decontrol measures which have been put into effect. Since the closing of the Roseburg office last spring, the local price panel has been under direction of the Eugene OPA office.

Since announcement was made recently of the closing of the Eugene office as well as of other OPA offices throughout the state, no word has come to the local price panel regarding OPA decontrols, McElligott said.

McElligott returned recently from a deer hunting trip and during his absence he had been out of touch with the price control agency. "It's a good thing OPA has ended," he said, "because public opinion was against it, right or wrong."
