Douglas County's Chest Fund Only Half Way to Goal

Oregon Chest funds collected in Roseburg and Douglas County stand at a little more than half of the original quota of \$20,240, as of November 19, according to a report of total funds raised throughout the State of Oregon. The report shows that a state total of \$328,245.97 has been raised for the Oregon Chest on the budget of \$392,835, leaving \$64,589.03 yet to be raised.

The official report, published by the Oregon Chest headquarters in Salem, lists the combined budget of Douglas County and Roseburg at \$20,240, of which \$3,079 is the quota to be reached for the Oregon Chest, the remainder going to local city and county agencies.

A total of \$12,000 has been raised in Douglas County, the report shows, with \$3,000 of that amount budgeted for the state agencies. Assuming that the average individual income for citizens of Oregon is equal to the average income throughout the United States, the report computes that the total income for 1946 in this state will be \$1,351,000,000. Income tax exempt, if given to charity, is 15 per cent, or \$203,000,000.

Leo Young, chairman of the county drive, reported this week that although area workers of the county have been slow in sending in their returns, he expects a considerable rise in the total figures following the cleanup drive which begins next week.
