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Trainee Pay Limit Boost to Be Asked

The unofficial Army and Navy Bulletin said last week that the Veterans Administration will ask that the ceiling figure for the on-the-job training subsistence payments be increased to \$300 a month from the present \$200.

The Bulletin quoted sources close to General Omar Bradley, veterans administrator, as saying that Bradley has decided the present ceiling has worked a hardship in a sufficient number of cases to justify new legislation.

Bradley, at the time the G.I. Bill of Rights was amended and subsistence limitations imposed, warned that abuses in the on-the-job program were approaching proportions of a national scandal.

But the V.A. chief said that the whole subject of pay for trainees would be studied, and that if hardships resulted from application of the new law, Congress would be asked to authorize a higher ceiling.

Two Escaped Convicts Subdued by Farmer

ROSEBURG, Tex., Nov. 25. — (AP) — A mild-mannered, 72-year-old retired farmer Saturday shot and subdued with their own gun two escaped convicts a day after they had hammered to death a guard at Huntsville state prison and fled.

Fred Wren, 23, one of the convicts, died a short time later in a hospital here. Ralph Dunlap, 26, the second fugitive, was expected to die.

The farmer, T. A. Burch, grappled with one of the men who entered his home and demanded his car keys. A car in which the convicts were fleeing had stuck in mud.

Burch seized the man's gun and in a struggle both men were shot. Burch was straddling the body of one of the fugitives when state highway patrolmen drove up.

The pair escaped yesterday after beating the guard and leaving him dying in an apartment across the street from the prison.

Hood River Victory Over Grant Predicted by Coach

PORTLAND, Nov. 25. — (AP) — The coach of the only eleven that has played both Oregon's prep championship finalists ventured the guess today that Hood River is about one touchdown better than Grant.

Paul Durham, whose Franklin High squad lost 41-0 to Hood River and 12-0 to the Grant Generals, predicted that a better forward wall would give this year's crown to the Dragons.

"Both teams have very strong lines, but in my opinion, Hood River's is a little stronger, especially at the ends and tackles," said Durham. He considers the backfields about evenly matched.

Broadhurst Extradition Papers Not Completed

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 25. — (AP) — request for a requisition for extradition of Mrs. Gladys Broadhurst, now being held in jail at Caldwell, Ida., charged with being an accessory after the fact to the murder of her husband, Willa D. Broadhurst, in Eastern Oregon, was received at the Executive Department here today but was immediately returned for completion of forms.
