Rates Hike Permit Asked
By West Coast Phone Co.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 27. (AP)—The West Coast Telephone company has applied for permission to increase its rates in Oregon by \$205,000 a year, the Public Utilities Department said today.

The company said the increase is needed to offset salary increases. It operates in the Coos Bay, Lakeview, LaGrande, Beaverton, Hillsboro, McMinnville and Gresham areas.

Hearings will be held before action is taken by Public Utilities Commissioner Flagg.

The company also operates in Washington state, where a similar rate increase is sought.

In Boy Delinquency Case

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 27. (AP)—William T. Tilden, 53, tennis pro and former national champion, pleaded guilty yesterday to a misdemeanor charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and applied for probation.

Superior Judge A. A. Scott set Dec. 19 for probation hearing and sentence. Tilden is at liberty on \$500 bond.

Bridge Jobs in Douglas

Lewis Not at Home to
Get Virginia Subpoena

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Nov. 27. (AP)—A Virginia official who sought to serve a new legal complaint on John L. Lewis reported today he had been advised that the United Mine Workers' chief spent the night away from his home here.

The summons directs Lewis to

appear Monday before the Virginia State Corporation Commission to show why the United Mine Workers Union should not be enjoined from selling memberships, as a violation of the Virginia Securities law.

"If I don't serve the papers today," Moriarty said, "Lewis will find them tacked on his door to night."

"I've served papers on Lewis before. He never dodges anything."
