Grant High Edges Hood River, 7 to 6, To Win Prep Title

Associated Press Staff Writer Grant's Generals are State High School football champions today, but they were just 11 guys in the rear rank yesterday until Quarterback Don O'Leary and his pass-minded Hood River mates forced them out of their punt-and-pray tactics.

Then for 90 seconds they opened up on their own to win, 7-6, before 15,000 fans in Portland for the second straight victory over Hood River in the finals of the Class A play-off.

Grant elected to go on the defensive and wait for the breaks on a muddy field. O'Leary, the best high school passer seen in Portland this year, gave them none.

Five times in the first half he passed Hood River deep into Grant territory, and despite the alert Generals, he couldn't be denied forever. Midway through the third period he connected.

It was a 37-yard play, O'Leary to Halfback Don Ostergard. For the conversion try, O'Leary flipped to the right flat to end Lloyd Woody, but he was bounced out or batted one yard short of the goal line.

That made it 6-0 for Hood River and the Generals promptly changed tactics. They took the next kick-off on their own 33. Then Quarterback Tom Shaw faded back and arched a long pass.

Duff Outruns Field.

It wobbled into a knot of players on the Hood River 35. Halfback Pat Duff leaped high to catch it, cut sharply to the left away from the others and outran everyone to the goal line.

Placekick Specialist Chuck Allen came in and booted the winning point squarely between the posts. It took just 90 seconds from the time Hood River scored and Grant went right back on the defensive. By this time the Generals had about solved the air attack. O'Leary passed Hood River to the Grant 15 late in the third period for the seventh deep Blue Dragon penetration, but the Generals covered sharply in the fourth quarter and there was not another completion.

All told, O'Leary completed four laterals and tossed 33 passes downfield, completing 12 of them. He stole the show from the Generals, marking up 13 first downs to Grant's 4. But Grant wound up with the points.

Henley Class B. Champion
Meanwhile little Henley of Klamath county was shading Grant's record of 20 straight victories in two seasons. Henley, undefeated in five years, captured the Class B title at La Grande by

downing North Powder, 13-0.

Fullback Fred Hess scored both touchdowns on a five-yard plunge in the third quarter and a one-yard drive in the fourth. He also booted the single Henley conversion.

North Powder made a game of it in the first half, but Henley's 15-pound-a-man weight advantage told in the closing periods.

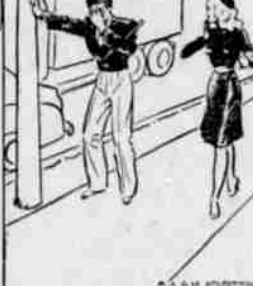

How to CAN or FREEZE leftover TURKEY

The beauty of roasting your own turkey, and especially a big one, is that you can have plenty of leftovers; for leftovers are no problem these days. It's so simple and easy to can or freeze them for another day.

Canning Leftover Turkey: Remove meat from carcass, combine with cream sauce or gravy; pack in hot sterilized jars with screw top lid. Tighten lids completely, and process in pressure cooker 75 minutes at 10 pounds pressure, or for 3 hours in hot water bath.

Freezing Leftover Turkey: Place slices or pieces of roast turkey in heavy cellophane bags, seal with hot iron. Freeze at below zero temperature. To serve, reheat to serving temperature, or thaw and slice cold.

Freezing Creamed Turkey: Cut meat from carcass, pack in meal-sized quantity in containers used for freezing fruits. Cover with cream sauce or gravy. Freeze at below zero temperature. To serve, remove frozen block from container and heat in top of double boiler. Use a la king, in meat pies, hash or croquettes.

Freezing Turkey Soup: Use bones of carcass to make soup stock, cool quickly. Package in cylindrical type containers. Freeze at below zero temperature. To serve, remove frozen block from container, heat and use as a base for turkey-vegetable soup.
