First Copies Of Driving Course for High Schools Out

First printed copies of the Oregon High School driving course have just come off the press. It has been announced by Secretary of State Forrell. Distribution to high school principals and superintendents will begin shortly.

The course is an eight-unit program designed to give high school students not only the technique of handling a car but also the responsibility as drivers. A similar course taught in Cleveland, Ohio, was found to have halved the accident rate among drivers who underwent it. Earlier announcements that the course would be made available to Oregon High Schools were greeted with widespread enthusiasm.

The program has been designed to fit into the state's required curriculum in health, physical education, and accident prevention wherever desired. While the general health and accident studies are required by law, the driver training is not. It may be included in the more general program whenever a school so elects. Oregon's course somewhat parallels military flight training in that it begins with "ground school" subjects and works up to actual behind-the-wheel practice. Planning and development were done cooperatively by the secretary of state's office, Portland traffic safety commission, Portland public schools, Oregon State Teachers' Association, and State Department of Public Instruction.

New Registrations Asked of Landlords

All landlords operating a hotel, rooming or boarding house, motor court, tourist court or space rented in an auto or trailer camp in Douglas County are required to file supplemental registration statements for their establishments before December 31, 1946. Jackson T. Moore, area rent director, announced today.

Landlords affected may obtain the necessary forms by calling at the local rent office in the Douglas County State Bank Building, Roseburg, or by writing for them. Mr. Moore explained that this registration is being conducted throughout the country to comply with a provision of the Price Control Extension Act of 1946, which directs CPA to classify separately transient hotels, residential or apartment hotels, rooming houses and tourist courts.

"It is vital that all landlords affected register promptly and file the registration form in duplicate so that their establishments may be classified properly on the basis of the data submitted," Mr. Moore said.

"Landlords in the area who rent only houses and apartments under the housing regulation need not file this additional registration and are not affected. Those required to register will find registration easy. They are required only to fill out a single-page form in duplicate and send or bring both copies to this office. After the forms have been checked, the duplicate copy will be returned to the landlord filing it with the classification of the establishment shown in the upper right hand corner.

Recreational exercise, thrills, and occasional spills are all being taken in their stride by large crowds of adults as well as the younger set of Roseburg at the newly-opened roller skating rink at the Armory each Monday and Friday nights and Saturday mornings.

Negotiated through the City Park Commission for a trial period of 90 days, Managers Erickson and Schweigart report more than 225 skating aspirants, adults as well as teenagers, crowded the floor last Friday night, with approximately 125 grade school children and younger, making their rounds on the rink during their special Saturday morning period. Last night's crowd numbered 135.

Harold Hickerson, member of the Park Commission, stated that he had never seen such enthusiasm and fun as displayed by the youngsters on the rink last Saturday morning.

Spills were numerous during the first two nights, but since that time the majority of participants have become quite proficient in the balance-yourself pastime and are already performing fancy maneuvering, leaving the center area of the floor to courageous novices and less adept skaters. Although the crowd is exceeding the present supply of men's shoe-type skates, Erickson said additional equipment will be here in two weeks.
