

American Sector Tops Illegitimacy Record in Berlin

BERLIN — Although the rate of illegitimacy in Berlin is high, public welfare officials in the Office of American Military Government for Berlin said that there are four times as many couples waiting to adopt such a child as there are children ready to be placed.

According to statistics of the German Youth Office 16.7 per cent of all children born in Berlin at present are illegitimate. The average rate last year was 18.4 per cent. In 1944 it was 23 per cent.

The youth office said that 17,285 of the children officially under its guardianship were illegitimate.

Whenever a foster home is reported or an application filed to adopt a child, the youth office first makes a careful study. Families which merely are seeking to supplement their income or take advantage of a child's better food ration card are immediately rejected.

It has been found most difficult to place boys in their early teens, officials said, because Germans under the present conditions fear to cope with the problems of wear and tear on clothes as well as food consumption.

The youth office reported that the rate of illegitimacy in the American sector was highest, standing at 19.2 per cent of all births. In the British sector, the figure was 17 per cent, in the French sector 16 per cent and in the Russian sector 14.6 per cent.

Farm Brevities

Good pastures and liberal feeding of concentrates are resulting in records in milk output per cow. But fewer milk cows are on the job and total milk production in October was 8.9 billion pounds, compared with 9.1 billion in October 1945. Through October of 1946, output totaled 2.3 billion less than for the first 10 months of last year.

Farm milk production goals about a billion pounds larger than this year's production have been recommended to States. The large supplies of available feeds should permit heavier feeding of dairy cows, and at the same time permit expansion of the 1947 spring pig crop and increased cattle-feeding. Some slowing down of the recent heavy rate of cul-

ing dairy herds is also recommended.

'Best Conservation Year'

The 1947 conservation practice programs now being developed by local AAA committees for each Oregon county will be the "best yet" for a direct attack on soil erosion and depletion problems, says E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the state PMA committee.

"If next year's program doesn't do the best job of fitting local needs, it won't be because county committees lacked the authority to make it fit," Miller said. He pointed out that the recommendations of the local committees were followed in developing the state handbook of 48 practices. In writing their county handbooks, committees now may select any or all of the practices in the state handbook, tighten or add to the specifications, revise rates of payment, and finally, may include one practice of their own that is not in the state handbook.

Phosphate Price Upped

One of the prime ingredients in most formulas for building up Oregon soils is going to cost more after the first of the year. An increase of \$1 a ton in the price of phosphate has been announced by the Idaho firm which has been the state's principal supplier of this material. The new price, effective January 1, will be \$30.40 a ton for 18 per

cent superphosphate, I. O. H. Portland warehouses.

Phosphate is one of the materials that farmers can obtain under the AAA conservation materials program. In previous years county AAA committees distributed about 8,000 tons of phosphate a year from material shipped into the state by plants under contract to the AAA. This year farmers obtained their conservation materials from dealers, on purchase orders issued by the county committee. Up to November 1, about 2100 tons had been delivered under the purchase order plan.

Spud Crop Looks Heavy
State PMA committee are

estimating that about one million hundredweight of Oregon's 1946 potato crop will be placed under commodity loan by the time the loan program closes December 15. Up to the end of November, producers had applied for loans on more than 700,000 hundredweight. The loan program is the means through which producers obtain the 90 per cent of parity support price protection pledged by the Steagall amendment.

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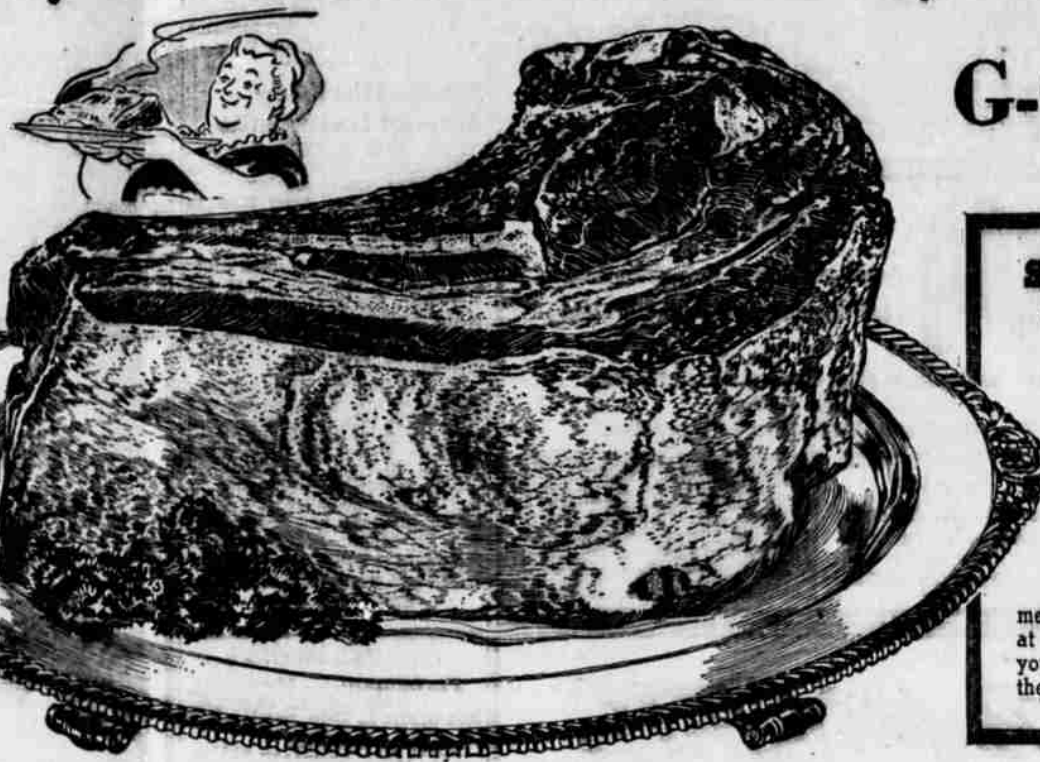
