

More Marines in China Will Return To United States

PEIPING, Dec. 6.—(AP)—U. S. Marine Corps headquarters today announced the last of the Leath-ernets will be withdrawn from guard duty on the Peiping-Mukden railroad the latter half of December.

The first and second battalions of the Seventh Regiment will be transferred to the West coast of the United States.

The withdrawal will leave Marines in Peiping, Tientsin, Tangku and Tsingtao. Those in the first three places will keep open the supply route to the U. S. branch of executive headquarters in Peiping. Those at Tsingtao are attached to the U. S. Seventh Fleet, which is training Chinese naval cadets.

Removal of the Marines completes the program in effect since they began guarding the railroad after the Japanese surrender. In mid-October, Marines were removed from other sections of the railroad when the Chinese National Army took over.

While the Marines guarded the line, service between Peiping and Chinwangtao seldom was interrupted, but since the government took over, Chinese communists have attacked trains, destroyed rails or blown up bridges almost daily.

Communist demolition units today wrecked a passenger train near Chating and a freight train near Peitang.

American observers said the Chinese communists could be expected to continue to demand the removal of the "few Marines" remaining in North China. One said the removal, long planned, had been held up for "an opportune moment."

China Peace Hope Not Brightened by New 'Commie' Bid

NANKING, Dec. 6.—(AP)—The Chinese Communists offered today to make a "fresh start" at peace negotiations but under such rigorous conditions that sources close to Chiang Kai-Shek said there was no possibility the offer would get serious consideration.

The offer came in the form of a formal communication from Gen. Chou En-Lai, chief Communist negotiator now back in Nanking, to General Marshall, special U. S. envoy.

Chou described the terms "as the only ones under which the Communists would consider resuming negotiations. They were: 1. The Kuomintang (government party) must dissolve immediately the National Assembly, which now is meeting in Nanking, drafting a new constitution. The Communists have refused to attend.

2. The government must restore the military situation to the status of Jan. 13, which would require government armies to give up broad stretches of North China wrested from the Communists since then.

Some quarters close to the generalissimo considered this "last offer" had blasted all hopes of further negotiations as well as the continuation of active American mediation.

They regarded the letter, which Chou asked Marshall to forward to the generalissimo, as a new attempt by the Communists to toss responsibility for a final split upon the government.

It was predicted that Marshall, in the face of the latest development, would make preparations

Former Finnish Leader to Honor New Republic

ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 6.—(AP)—Twenty nine years ago today Oskari Tokol, one-time prime minister of Finland, was fleeing the government he will honor tonight in an address here marking the founding of the Finnish republic.

New editor of the Fitchburg, Mass., *Raivaaja* (Pioneer), Tokol was the leader of the short-lived Finnish government which took over the country at the time of the collapse of Czarist Russia in 1917.

A civil war followed and Tokol and his followers were overthrown. He escaped to the Karelia section of Finland, then as now held by the Russians and later headed for the protection of the Kremlin.

With the defeat of the counter-revolutionary movement in Russia, Tokol faced the prospect of being returned home. However, the British made it possible for

Born of Jewish parentage in 1902, in Moghiller, Russia, Dr. Appleman came to Chicago in 1914. There he received his grammar school, high school and law school education. He was licensed to practice law in October, 1921.

Dr. Appleman was converted to Christianity through the ministry of Dr. James E. Davis in the Central Christian Church at Denver, Colo., March, 1925. Two years later he joined the Baptist Church, and was ordained in 1930 at Lawton, Okla.

He attended the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Fort Worth, Tex., from 1930 to 1933. He served as pastor of Baptist churches and was state evangelist for the Texas Baptist Convention from 1934 to 1942. Since 1942, he has been an interdenominational evangelist.

Dr. Appleman comes to Roseburg following an evangelistic mission held at Eugene. His meetings are interdenominational in scope.
