WOMAN'S CLUB HOLDS FOUNDER'S DAY PROGRAM IN CHURCH PARLORS

An interesting sketch of early days with the Roseburg Woman's Club, opened the club meeting at the First Presbyterian Church parlors Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. K. D. Lytle, in charge of the Founder's Day program gave a resume of the life of the club founder, Mrs. G. R. Child, who was the inspiration and originator of the "35 Culture Club" in this city, later being known as the Roseburg Woman's Club.

Mrs. Child, who was an early day teacher, moved to Roseburg with her husband, and desiring an outlet for her study and companionship through the help of Miss Haynes, now Mrs. Kerr and Miss Bushey, the Mrs. Bradley (now deceased), organized the study club. This was the second club to be organized in Oregon and one of the very early woman's clubs in the United States.

Mrs. Lytle paid tribute to this early founder whose foresight has carried through more than 50 years of continued inspiration to Roseburg women in a high standard of living.

Mrs. J. F. Barker, Jeannie Buick, Mrs. Marie Flint McCall, Mrs. James Sawyers and Mrs. George Brown gave thumbnail sketches of the club founder. Corages were presented these members by Mrs. Lytle.

Present impressions of Mrs. Child were given by Mrs. A. J. Goddes, Mrs. Armour Murdoch and Mrs. Glenn Wimberly, after which pictures of the charter members, at the time of the founding, were shown.

The second portion of the program was devoted to "Civic Needs" in charge of Mrs. George E. Houck, who showed pictures of early day Roseburg and spoke of the ever constant need for civic projects.

First guest speaker was Dr. A. C. Seeley, who told of the Commercial Club, which began in 1910 and in 1918 became known as the Chamber of Commerce. The Commercial Club was the first civic club in Roseburg.

Attorney Carl Felker spoke of the need for a modern airport and urged women to back the proposed airport plan, since Roseburg needs this development to progress modern business.

Charles Stanton pointed out progress already made on recreational facilities and need for more development. He showed that Roseburg must offer something adequate in shopping, wholesale and financial fields, also, to maintain the county center the city must have recreation for the people of outlying communities. He suggested parks, playgrounds, and a civic auditorium. Recreation is "big business" and if it develops, the city will have the boom is over, Mr. Stanton said.
