Alleged Drunken Driver Fined in Fatal Crash

ELLENBURG, Wash., Dec. 11. (AP)—Two Spokane men were instantly killed last night when their automobile crashed into the rear of a parked truck on the Snoqualmie Highway, two miles East of Cle Elum.

The dead men are Theodore R. Day 41, and Chester R. Harvey, 23.

Sgt. A. L. Baker of the state patrol said the driver of the truck was Donald E. Poynter, 21, of Seattle. Baker said Poynter was remonstrating with an alleged drunken driver, who had run off the road in his car, to get out of the way of Poynter's truck when the Spokane automobile, driven by Ray, smashed into the rear of the timber-laden truck. The driver of the ditched car was held in the Cle Elum jail.
