

Murder Thriller To Be Radio Debut Of Local Players

"Murder for Ducks, a 30-minute radio murder thriller, will be presented on KRNR tonight at 8:30 by local talent of the newly-organized KRNR Radio Players group.

Written over the weekend by Hal Berneyer, noted Hollywood script writer, radio actor and producer, the play will be a production identical with any commercial radio show, complete with professional sound effects and producers.

The play itself delves around the ownership of a duck club and, Berneyer states, "is definitely of the suspense type, complete with all the usual blood and guts."

The first attempt at this type of professional producing in Roseburg, Berneyer explained that the object of this program is to give the local public a chance at self-expression, through microphone acting, script writing, and adaptation to radio for those interested.

In its experimental stage, the interest shown toward this first presentation will determine further shows and possibly weekly presentations by the players group, which is open to the public. Also local script writers and short story writers may submit their work for possible adaptation to this program upon further development.

The first play's cast has seven local persons, including Helen Case, Annaloris Ward, Laurie Cummins, Albert Flegel, Allen Cordon, Del McKay, and Bernard Steinberger.
