Oregon's Jobless Total Hiked 3,500 in Month

PORTLAND, Dec. 16.—(AP)—A slash in holiday sales staffs by retail stores here and industrial layoffs resulted in an increase of 3,500 persons on the unemployed list from November to December, the State Employment Service reported.

The agency said Multnomah, Washington and Columbia Counties have 19,500 idle and added that "practically all signs of contemplated expansion were pulled down" during the period.

Of the total unemployed, 4,800 are veterans and 4,000 are women.

James Huntington, Sr., 54, died Friday in a Eugene hospital after a long illness. He was born at Yoncalla, Dec. 31, 1891, the son of pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Huntington. He was a life-long resident of that community and a member of the Methodist Church in which he was very active.

A farmer, he at one time raised large numbers of turkeys. He was married to Mrs. Helen H. Hamilton, May 17, 1922.

Surviving are the widow, two sons and three daughters: James, Jr., Coral Irene, Anna Maire, Helen Janet, and David Elton Huntington, all of Yoncalla.

Six brothers and six sisters also survive: Benjamin and Phil Huntington of Coos Bay; Webster and Peret Huntington of Yoncalla; McKinley and Fossell Thomas Huntington of Richmond, Ore.; Mrs. Reta Turner of Rockaway; Mrs. Anna Kingery, Yoncalla; Mrs. Sarah Wertz and Mrs. Rachel Laftin of Grants Pass; Mrs. Mary Nichols, Corvallis, and a half-sister, Mrs. Lucille Hinder-shott, Seattle.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist Church, Tuesday, at 2 P. M. in Yoncalla, with the Rev. Fred O. Hunt officiating. Interment in Yoncalla Cemetery will follow. Arrangements are in care of Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Rate of Traffic Deaths Higher on Rural Highways

Non-city accidents now claim three out of four lives taken in Oregon motor crashes, it has been announced by Secretary of State Farrell.

Never before has the percentage of victims been so heavily in rural areas. A newly completed study shows the trend is constantly increasing. While city auto deaths have risen 11 per cent in the past year, rural deaths have jumped 63 per cent.

The great bulk of the state's accidents takes place inside cities and towns, where traffic is heaviest and most of the mileage is piled up," said Farrell. "But most of the fatalities occur in the relatively few rural accidents. Severity in rural crashes is extremely high."

Risky passing and high speed account for most of the bad wrecks on the open road.

Speed and volume checker indicate that few drivers realize how heavily fatalities are weighted toward rural areas. Most recent tabulations show over half the cars on some main arterials are averaging speeds above the very top limit permitted under the law. The results are reflected in the fatality records.

Farrell pointed out that one city wreck in 300 is fatal. In non-city wrecks, however, one in 45 is fatal. In other words, death strikes between six and seven times as frequently among rural accidents as among those in cities.

Rent Boost O. K. If Lease Granted, Senators Advised

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—(AP) Calvin K. Snyder of the National Association of Real Estate Boards told senators yesterday that tenants would accept up to a 15 per cent rent increase if they received a year's lease.

Snyder testified before the complaint subcommittee of the Senate Small Business Committee that his organization had put the question to its member boards in 157 cities in 36 states.

Boards in 96 per cent of the reporting cities answered that the tenants would accept the increase on that condition, he said, adding that "every city of over 50,000 population answered 'yes' to this question."

Snyder said that his organization does not favor outright lifting of rent controls at this time, but does believe that an increase of up to 15 per cent should be permitted.

Joseph Meyerhoff, president of the National Association of Home Builders, urged the removal of all federal housing restrictions, asserting:

"Only by building a great surplus of houses in all price classes, but particularly rental housing, can we bring down the ultimate cost of a home."

Miss Anderson's Class of Debaters Posts High Score

Word has been received here that Miss Amanda Anderson's debate and extemporaneous speaking teams scored high in a recent Western Association of Teachers' Annual Speech Tournament held at San Jose, Calif., Nov. 25-27. Miss Anderson is now a faculty member at Salem High school and formerly was an instructor at Senior High school in this city.

Eleven states participated in this tournament and the Salem team placed first in debate and second and third in extemporaneous speaking in the high school division.

As so often happens at this time of year, hatching egg producers are having difficulty in disposing of all their eggs. Turkey gobblers are about the cheapest meat in the world, so fryers are being neglected by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Doaks.
