First Half of Arms Cut Program Gets Approval

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—A United Nations subcommittee with an unexpected burst of speed quickly approved the first half of a draft plan on world arms reduction today after voting two amendments.

The new provisions injected into the arms plan: 1. Added a requirement that any program adopted by the Security Council must be approved by a special session of the 44-nation general assembly in addition to a stipulation already accepted that it must be ratified by individual U. N. member states. 2. Laid down a specific condition that any arms reduction program must provide for the control of atomic energy "to the extent necessary to ensure its use only for peaceful purposes."

Coin Collecting Now in Midst of Biggest Boom

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Coin collecting—the world's oldest hobby—is enjoying such a boom now that a ten-inch strand of Indian wampum costs a hundred bucks.

But the price has zoomed too late to help the unwary Redskin who fashioned this shell money centuries before John Smith became the most popular name in the phone books.

Wampum is just one of 100,000 specimens of money stocked in stacks by the Stack brothers—Joseph B. and Morton—since their grandfather became a coin dealer in 1838.

If you think coin collecting is just an Indian-head penny game for the kiddies, it may interest you to know that this year the Stack firm sold a \$3 gold piece minted in San Francisco for \$16,000.

But you have to be careful. The Stacks know a man who paid \$5,000 for what he thought was a \$5 gold piece of 1815. When he tried to insure it, however, it turned out to be an 1813 gold piece worth only \$50. A counterfeit had worked on the piece.

Coin collecting is now in the midst of its biggest boom with an estimated quarter of a million followers in this country alone. Joseph Stack estimates about 40,000 of these are "serious" collectors.

"Prices have doubled since the war" chiefly because of the increased demand," he said. One of the chief stimulants has been the sending home by American soldiers of souvenir coins from abroad.

Coins proved a real wartime hedge against disaster for many Europeans.

"I know of at least two dozen refugees who founded successful businesses here through the sale of coins they had brought to this country," said Joseph.

Snell Disagrees With Some New Tax Proposals

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 14.—(AP)—Governor Snell said yesterday he disagrees with several recommendations made by the State Tax Study Commission, but he did not disclose which ones.

The commission's major recommendations were for a business tax of 1/2 of 1 per cent, reducing state income tax exemptions, and discontinuing the property tax for state purposes. The governor said he would disclose his own tax program in his message to the legislature, and the Tax Study Commission's report that he would endorse much of it.

There is one-way traffic on the Columbia River Highway at Tongue Point because of a slide, while there is water over the same road near Rainier, but traffic was going through all right.
