Development of Pulp-Timber Area In Alaska Nears

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Alaska appeared today to be on the long-awaited verge of pulp-timber development.

"Conversations have been under way for many months with several interests who are actively seeking to develop the pulp and paper industry in the territory," Secretary of Interior I. L. Igoe told a reporter.

Krug estimated that Alaska can produce 1,000,000 tons of newsprint paper a year—a quarter of the nation's needs.

From Senator Carl Hayden (D-Ariz.), chairman of the joint committee on printing, came an intimation that if private industry continues to be slow about Alaskan development, the government may have to take a hand.

"Nobody wants the government to build a paper mill up there if private industry will do so," the senator told a reporter.

"But we have to print the Congressional Record—and we have to have the paper to do it."

Other signs of likely future development:

1. The Forest Service has surveyed half a dozen blocks of pulp timber which could be made available for public advertisement upon short notice.

2. Three large industrial groups investigated the major Alaskan pulp-timber stands last summer, the first to interest themselves seriously since the ambitious development plans of the late 20's were nullified by the depression.

Lawyer Sues George Raft For Alleged Beating

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Edward Ralden, Los Angeles attorney, filed suit yesterday for \$300,000 damages from George Raft for a beating he alleged the actor gave him when he tried to recover for a young movie aspirant jewelry and other presents he declared Raft had given her.

Ralden's complaint asserted he called at the apartment of the 19-year-old actress, Betty Doss, one evening last December and that while a body guard held the attorney's arms behind him, Raft beat him and struck him in the groin and stomach with his knee.

Later, it alleged, Raft compelled Miss Doss and her mother to sign a paper dismissing Ralden.

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Dying Son Forgives Drunken Father For Shooting Him

ANDERSON, S. C., Dec. 16.—(AP)—Amos Brown, 40-year-old carpenter, was under a charge of murder here today in the brutal shotgun slaying of his 17-year-old son, who forgave his father as he lay dying.

Details of the tragedy were recounted to a coroner's jury by the sobbing, grief-stricken mother, Mrs. Fannie Mae Brown, who told how she stood by helplessly and witnessed the shooting.

She quoted her son, Alvin Brown, as saying after he had been shot: "Don't harm daddy. His heart is black with sin, but I forgive him."

The youth died in a hospital Friday of the wounds he received the previous night.

Testifying to events leading up to the tragedy, Mrs. Brown said her husband had been drinking heavily for two weeks. Alvin had just driven his father home from a nearby filling station and soon after they reached home the father called his son into the yard and fired two blasts into his thighs, the second one as the boy was falling, she related.

"His father had threatened him so much that I really don't believe the little fellow thought he would kill him," Mrs. Brown told the jury. Brown, questioned yesterday at the county jail, said

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Work Spirit Lacking, New C. of C. Head Says

PORTLAND, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Sidney F. Woodbury took over the presidency of the Portland Chamber of Commerce today after an inaugural address in which he said "we're in a very sad mess and we all know it."

The civic and business leader told members in his last night's speech that "we are a nation sick in spirit and in purpose. No one cares particularly if he works, though each is determined to get a higher rate of pay and just as determined not to fairly produce."

He advocated the "Golden Rule" but noted that "the rub is to get anyone to follow it."
