

3-Way Pressure On Forest Industry Told by Greeley

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—The forest industry is getting pressure from three directions for formulation of future operation policies, Col. W. B. Greeley, Seattle, told 500 foresters from western states and Canada.

Speaking at the annual conference of the Western Forestry and Conservation Association, the former chief forester of the United States and present vice-president of the American Forestry Association, identified the pressures as coming in these directions:

Leftist — CIO International Woodworkers of America, seeking federal control of commercial cutting, federal subsidies for good forest practices and enlarged federal holdings;

Slightly left of center — U. S. forest service, which wants the federal government to set standards for the states to enforce under threat of the federal government enforcing them;

Rightist — The lumber industry, which seeks to place reliance on private industry, with states enacting controls to fit the local situation.

The answer to maintenance of forests is combined public-private lands operated as a sustained-yield unit, Corydon Wagner, Tacoma, told the group. The units

should be operated, he said by private firms which have demonstrated they are capable of carrying out a sustained yield program. The association is made up of state and industry foresters from five western states.

Judge, 'Fed Up,' Hands Auto Thief Four Years

LA GRANDE, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—James W. Hylton, Klamath Falls, drew a four-year prison sentence in circuit court here because Judge R. J. Green is "fed up" with car thefts and burglaries in this area.

Hylton pleaded guilty to entering a garage with intent to steal, but said he was intoxicated at the time. He added that he had served four years in the Army and had planned to re-enlist.

The judge said something had to be done as "a warning to others who may think they can get by with crime in Union county," and sentenced him to the penitentiary.

Minister Asks Christmas Omission of Radio News

MALVERN, England, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The Rev. H. J. Freilinger, Malvern vicar, appealed to the British Broadcasting Corporation today to omit news broadcasts on Christmas Day.

"We can do without news for one day," he said, "so will the BBC let us forget Russia and Greece and riots, and concentrate on the peace which God offers?" British newspapers do not publish on Christmas.

Atomic Energy Advisers Named

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Appointment of a general advisory committee, headed by President James B. Conant of Harvard university, to advise the atomic energy commission on scientific and technical matters has been announced by President Truman.

Other members of the committee are Lee A. Du Bridge, president of the California Institute of technology; Enrico Fermi, professor of physics, University of Chicago; J. R. Oppenheimer, wartime director of the Los Alamos laboratory of the Manhattan district; I. I. Rabi, professor of physics, Columbia university; Hartley Rowe, vice president of the United Fruit Company; Glenn T. Seaborg, chief radiochemist for the Manhattan district at the University of Chicago; Cyril Stanley Smith, director of the University of Chicago's Institute of Metals; and Hood Worthington, chemical engineer for Du Pont de Nemours and Company.

Mr. Truman said in a news conference statement that the atomic energy commission, headed by David E. Lilienthal, will establish other committees later to advise it on other technical problems.

The group appointed today will concentrate on matters relating to materials, production and research.

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Restrictions Off Forty Products

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—(AP)—The office of temporary controls announced last week a major revision of stockroom controls over manufacturers, removing them entirely from clay and cement bricks and concrete blocks.

At the same time the OTC's civilian production division removed design and style restrictions from men's work clothing. Restrictions on work clothing, in effect since Aug. 8, 1942, limited the yardage permitted in such clothing as well as the number of pockets, buttons, pocket flaps and cuffs.

In all, the OTC lifted inventory controls from 40 products, brought six materials under new inventory limits and related existing controls over 18 products.

These actions were the first decontrol moves by OTC since its creation to liquidate the affairs of CPA and OPA.

Manufacturers of the 40 products removed from inventory control previously had been prohibited from maintaining more than a "practicable minimum inventory."

The restrictions are designed to prevent manufacturers from withholding finished goods from market in anticipation of price increases.
