The Southern Division of the newly formed Douglas County Commercial Hoop League walked away last night with the jamboree tournament held at Roseburg High School gym with five out of six Southern quintets winning over the northerners in the evening's six 20-minute contests.

Well attended by team supporters from throughout the county, fans were given a preview of the ragged but promising ball players who will provide the action in the league's round-robin tournament which gets under way in January.

Umpqua Valley Hardware's starting quintet began the Southern division's lead and edged past J. K. Sporting Goods' squad, 9-5, in a slow but smooth working game. The J. K. outfit set up a zone defense practically unpenetrable, as the Hardwareers found their eye and successfully shot over. Scoring for the two clubs was evenly divided with Young sinking three crucial free throws to sustain the victors' lead to the end.

Selfarth Sparks Elks

Norman Selfarth led his Elks to victory over the V. F. W. in the second contest, scoring 10 points from the keyhole practically untouched, in a ragged contest in which both teams were slow in getting their shooting eyes adept to hitting the hemp. Vonnie Baker was high pointer for the Vets with four.

American Women Rap Marriages of GIs to Frauleins

FRANKFURT, Germany, Dec. 13. (AP)—American women now living in Germany differ decidedly in their views on the newly authorized GI-fraulein marriages, while some German girls favor caution in exercising the privilege.

"I don't like it at all," a WAC sergeant said when informed of the decision yesterday by U. S. Army Theater Headquarters to

permit soldiers about to return home to marry German girls.

She did not give her name, commenting that "the things I'd like to say about American soldiers marrying Germans shouldn't be quoted in print."

"I don't think it should be done," said WAC Cpl. Blanche Barrington, of Carlbad, N. M. "A lot of German women will take advantage of GIs and use marriage as an excuse to get into the states."

Mrs. John M. Konoak of Orlando, Fla., also criticized the change in regulations, saying that "there are lots of good American women sitting at home waiting to get married and can't."

Her husband sided with her

but for another reason:

"I think the German people should first establish themselves and prove that they can get along with the rest of the world before we start German-American marriages."

Several soldiers—and some frauleins—also emphasized that German girls now might use marriage to Americans as a means of escaping from war-torn Germany.

Lt. Lucille Riggs, an American nurse of Medford, Ore., said she believed many German girls would prove excellent wives, adding: "I have met war brides of many nationalities, and these German girls impress me in comparison with the girls of other countries."
