Christmas Tree Crop in Douglas Said Abundant

An abundant Christmas tree crop is reported within Douglas County by the Forestry Department, and while several "no trespassing" signs will undoubtedly go unnoticed as in previous years, it looks as if every home will display a tree.

Despite a shortage of trinkets used to trim the trees in traditional style, merchants report that sales thus far have not completely exhausted their stocks.

Three retailers selling trees, mistletoe and holly on vacant lots within the city report sales at an all-time high. One agent reported a complete truck load of firs sold on his first day of operation.

The standard price within Roseburg this year is 25 cents per foot, which is approximately the same price-level as last year. Holly and mistletoe, selling at 25 cents per pound, but are termed as an expendable item, due to their drying tendencies. Holly wreaths were reported as slightly higher than in 1945.

Total Disability Insurance Is Now Available to Vets

Veterans who have national service life insurance now may be insured against total disability. Tom Collins, Veterans Administration representative at the Roseburg Facility, pointed out today. Congressional act allows an ex-serviceman to add to any NSLI policy income benefits by written application, proof of good health, and payment of an extra premium. This premium will range from six cents to 94 cents a month for each \$1,000 of insurance, depending on the veteran's age and type of policy, Collins explained.

Disability benefits amount to \$5 a month for each \$1,000 of insurance, are payable after the insured has been totally disabled continuously for six months or more, and will continue as long as he is disabled. The disability must start before the veteran's 60th birthday, however.
