Livestock Feeding May Solve Wheat Surplus Problem

SALEM, Ore. — (AP) — While state agencies are seeking further uses of wheat in industry as a means of solving the acute surplus wheat problem that is expected in a year or two, Prof. A. W. Oliver of the Oregon State College Animal Husbandry Department thinks he has a partial answer. He thinks much of the anticipated surplus could be used for fattening all types of livestock. Professor Oliver points out that 75,000 feeder cattle are produced each year in Oregon but are sent to other states for fattening. He wants wheat to be used to fatten them in Oregon. Forty per cent of Oregon's lambs are sold as feeders, and the Pacific Coast produces only half the pork it eats. Storage facilities for wheat are inadequate, to give more of the professor's arguments for using wheat for livestock. He says ground wheat is as good as other grains for fattening animals, but that the amount of grain required can be reduced by 25 to 35 per cent by use of pasture crops such as alfalfa, clover, growing grain or grass. With all grains, protein supplements are needed. Profit Building Cited Professor Oliver says that when 100 pounds of pork, live weight, on the farm sells for the same as 650 pounds of grain, the hog raiser will get pay for his feed, interest, taxes, labor and other expenses. If ground wheat sells for \$40 a ton, hogs would have to sell for 13 cents a pound on the farm to pay the costs. A 700-pound yearling steer fed 800 pounds of ground wheat and 2,400 pounds of hay can be fattened in only 100 days. He said cattle will gain more rapidly on pasture and grain than in the feed lot. One hundred pounds of whole wheat and 200 pounds of alfalfa will get a lamb ready for market in 100 days, the lamb weighing 60 or 70 pounds at the start of the feeding and 90 to 100 pounds when ready for market. The U. S. Department of Agriculture said Oregon and California are the only two Western states which have an increase over last year in the number of cattle in feed lots. Butter Prices Falling Butter market prices are falling because consumers are resisting high prices, and because the supply is becoming more plentiful due to diversion of milk from cheese and fluid cream to butter, the USDA says. When farmers make out their federal income tax estimates, which are due January 15, they shouldn't forget that they can deduct premiums paid for federal crop insurance.

Four sisters also survive: Mrs. Mary Chapman, Glendale; Mrs. Walter Singleton, Roseburg; Mrs. Frankie Martin, Grants Pass, and Mrs. Rosa Anderson, Healdsburg, Calif. Services will be held in the Christian Church, Drain, Sunday at 2 P. M., with the Rev. James Foyell officiating. Interment will be in the Applegate cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Adventists Again To Aid Needy in European Areas

Tragic famine conditions in Europe are again brought forcibly to the attention of the Roseburg Seventh Day Adventist Church today by the united effort of the denomination in America, to raise a half-million dollars on a single day, Elder J. J. Robertson said. This amount is the goal set by the church for another famine relief offering today. A cablegram sent to church headquarters from Europe and passed on to leaders here reveals famine conditions in Central Europe far worse than last year. This message comes from W. E. Nelson, of Washington, D. C., general conference treasurer, now visiting churches in Europe. He further says: "Drought and requisition leave indescribable want, disease and suffering. Thousands will succumb this winter and spring unless we do more than last year for Germany and Austria. Conditions in other countries much improved." Elder Robertson said he believed that this report will be "taken seriously" by the Adventist churches of America and that they will "vigorously continue" to raise money and to supply more food and clothing. Figure show that the Adventist relief organization working in Europe has during recent months shipped upwards of a million dollars worth of foods into Austria, Hungary, Germany, Poland and Czechoslovakia, where they have been effectively distributed. Many letters of appreciation have been received. Adventist churches have also united in providing some 800 tons of clothing to war stricken areas.

The league recommended employment of a full-time weed control expert at Oregon State College, and proposed that county courts be required by law to provide funds for a weed control program when voted by districts. The league also asked that all income-production property, public as well as private, be taxed and that the federal government pay states 2 per cent of the assessed valuation of National Forest land.
