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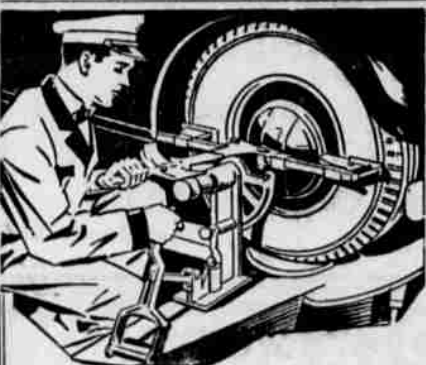

High Court Links Pleas Of Lewis and Mine Union

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today granted John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers a hearing on a new appeal questioning the validity of the preliminary injunction issued against them during the recent soft coal strike. The effect is to broaden the issues of law before the court in Lewis' appeal from the \$10,000 fine imposed on him and the \$3,500,000 fine on the union for contempt of court.

In earlier petitions, Lewis and the union challenged the validity of temporary restraining orders issued in the same case by U. S. District Judge Goldsborough here. The Supreme Court, in accepting the latest appeal, consolidated it with the appeals granted earlier. Argument on all of the issues will be heard January 14.

PORTLAND, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Two gunmen held up a drug store late Saturday night and escaped with \$100 cash after herding the owner to one part of the store and a 17-year-old boy to another section.

Six-Hour Power Failure Due To Broken Cross-Arm

A six-hour power failure Sunday was ascribed by officials of the California-Oregon Power Company today to the breaking of a wooden cross arm on a pole of the company's main transmission line, in the Milo area between Canyonville and Tiller.

Power went off at 10:10 A. M. and was not restored in some parts of the city until 4:29 P. M. Service to the main business district was resumed at 2 o'clock. Supplementary power from the Coos Bay transmission line was not available, it was stated, because boilers of the Coos Bay steam plant were cold, due to the smaller power load required on Sundays.

In several churches, where choirs presented special services of Christmas music, pianos were used in place of electrically operated pipe organs for musical accompaniment.

Radio Station KRNK was temporarily out of operation. Dr. Morris H. Roach, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, where the morning services were to be broadcast, told his congregation, "I think this should be a lesson to those who are not here, not to depend upon the radio for their church services."

Hotel dining rooms did a rushing business, as families with electric stoves were unable to cook their Sunday dinners.

Tourists at one hotel, who hoped to fill the tank of their car with gasoline and leave the city, were temporarily stranded here, as service station pumps could not be operated.

Mrs. Martha Wilma Ford, Visitor at Brockway, Dies

Martha Wilma Ford, 75, of Dayton, Wash., died Saturday at the home of her son, William Weir, in Brockway. She was born March 16, 1871, in Wisconsin. She had come to Brockway just a week ago to spend the Christmas holidays with her son and his family. Mrs. Ford was a member of the Baptist Church.

Besides her son, she is also survived by a grandson, at Brockway. The body will be shipped by the Roseburg Funeral Home tomorrow night to Dayton, Wash., for funeral services and interment.
