Food For Lunch Program
Oregon's abundant food list for December includes potatoes, onions, apples, turkeys and canned orange and grapefruit juice as foods which will be in plentiful supply throughout the state during the month. The list is prepared by the state PMA office for distribution to school lunch programs.

Spuds For Stock Feed
The state PMA committee has been given authority to sell surplus potatoes for use as livestock feed when no other outlets can be found for spuds delivered by producers in repayment of price-sup-

port loans. Loans have been made in 11 counties, but so far Klamath is the only county where surplus potatoes are available for feed.

Here's how fresh potatoes compare with other feedstuffs: 400-450 pounds of grain fed to cattle, sheep and horses; 400 pounds of potatoes (cooked) are equal to 100 pounds of grain fed to hogs; 100 pounds of potatoes are equal to 100 pounds of corn silage for dairy cows and beef cattle.

Potatoes contain about twice as much digestible nutrients as wet beet pulp or best tops, but only about one-third the nutrients of alfalfa hay.

Farmers who have used fresh potatoes for cattle feed report that they stimulate digestive action and keep the animals in good condition. Only sound potatoes should be fed, because the toxic content in decayed, frozen, sprouted or green potatoes may be high enough to be injurious. Feeding should start in small quantities and be gradually increased, and potatoes should be cut or chopped to prevent animals from choking on the whole potatoes. Potatoes fed for milk or beef production should be fed raw or in silage. For hogs, spuds should be cooked.

Wool Carry-Over Heavy
Large carry-over stocks of wool will probably remain a problem

for some time, although the recovery of wool consumption in many counties has been encouragingly rapid. World stocks of wool were estimated last June 30 at 5 million pounds, three times as much as before the war. Of this amount, 2.6 billion pounds are owned by governmental organizations—\$1 per cent by the United Kingdom and the balance by the Commodity Credit Corporation in the United States.

Outlook for disposal appears better than a year ago, because large quantities of British Dominion wool have moved from governmental to private ownership during 1945-46. World wool production in 1946 is expected to reach 3.7 billion pounds, about the same as the 1945 output and the prewar average.

Official British reports speak of Egypt as being in the Middle East. The U. S. State Department refers to it as being in the Near East.

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Daun Lillard Serving on Antarctic Expedition

Daun C. Lillard, 18, seaman, second class, USN, son of James L. Lillard, 225 Haynes St., is serving aboard the seaplane tender USS Pine Island, one of the 13 ships which comprise Task Force 68, the Navy's Antarctic expedition.

This expedition, called "Operation Highjump," will explore the vast icy regions of the Antarctic for approximately four months, training personnel, testing equipment, and developing Navy technique for establishing and maintaining bases in frigid areas.

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
