Boost in Douglas County Jobs Shown in Report

Douglas County added more than 2,500 jobs in trade and industry during the first year after the war's end, the State Unemployment Commission said today. Seven other counties added a thousand or more persons to trade and industrial payrolls during the year. Lane County jumped from 18,876 jobs on V-J Day to 17,125 last September. Marion County was close behind, jumping from 13,429 to 16,482. Douglas County increased from 4,350 to 6,879 jobs.

Cinematically speaking, Alan Ladd goes to sea in "Two Years Before the Mast," currently playing at the Indian theater in the picture adapted from the book by Richard Henry Dana.

One of the younger set's favorite fictions, the picture has particular appeal to those who love tales of sailing ships and the men who crewed them. It also gives a vivid depiction of the hardships endured by the early American seamen.

Ladd, who sky-rocketed to screen fame almost overnight, is cast in the role of a rich ship-

owner's son who is shanghaied and forced to sea.

Sharing top billing with Ladd are Brian Donlevy, Howard da Silva, William Bendix and Barry Fitzgerald.

There is plenty of action in this drama of the sea and also considerable romance, with Esther Fernandez, Mexico's outstanding actress and Hollywood's latest find, cast opposite Ladd as his leading lady.

Howard da Silva, as Captain Francis Thompson, the inexorable disciplinarian, who rules his ship's crew with an iron hand, gives one of the finest performances of his screen career.

Donlevy and Bendix, too, render excellent portrayals in this saga of the brig Pilgrim, which sailed from Boston in 1834 for

California, bent on making a record voyage around the Horn.
