

RHS Quintet To Face St. Mary's In League's Opener

Roseburg High School's basketball team, having completed a favorable pre-season schedule and definitely proving themselves as progressive in improvement with each game, begin Tri-County action Saturday night against St. Mary's of Eugene.

Following two hard-fought wins over Bend last weekend, the Indian camp was idle this week as Coach Jack Newby and several of the hoopers attended the East-West game New Year's Day at San Francisco with the Roseburg football team.

In eight contests thus far, Newby's charges have racked up a total of 241 points. Bill Eenson, rugged 6-foot-4-inch forward, accounted for 75 of these, followed by Gary Piper, Benson's running mate, with 65, for two definite scoring threats to oncoming league competition which includes St. Mary's, Eugene, University High, Springfield, Junction City, Cottage Grove and Elmira.

Saturday night's game should give an indication of the actual strength of the two teams within league play, as the Gaels, newly added to A school standing, more than gave a good account of themselves against Eugene last week with an exceptionally tight defense.

Axemen Major Threat
Eugene, defending state champs, face Springfield Friday night for a tilt which could end in an upset as the game is being played on the Millers' home court. The Axemen, already claiming leadership in the circuit by way of victories over Elmira and St. Mary's, are reported as a hot and cold team. Springfield handed Elmira a defeat in their only conference tussle thus far.

Junction City's Tigers face Cottage Grove Friday night and will be favored, as the Lions suffer from graduation and ineligibilities.

University High battles Corvallis this weekend, beginning league play next Tuesday against Junction City.
