A review from the San Francisco News classed him as "a young pianist with the electrifying qualities of a Horowitz, with his technique leaving listeners breathless. And, still more important, he offers interpretations that bespeak both a fresh viewpoint and a maturity beyond his years."

Admission to all concerts are by membership only with the 1946-47 concert membership rolls closed last November by a complete sellout.

March of Dimes Chairmen Attend State Conference

March of Dimes chairmen for Roseburg and Douglas County returned yesterday from a special meeting at Portland, where they received final headquarters plans for the fund-raising campaign which opens January 15 and closes January 30.

Attending the meeting of representative chairmen from throughout the state were I. McKay and Al Henninger, who participated in several interesting discussions and visited Portland hospitals.

Main speaker of the meet was Basil O'Connor, director of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, who outlined the campaign's main objectives and gave a history of the foundation during its eight years of operation.

Former law partner of the late President Roosevelt, O'Connor stated that this year's national goal has been set at \$24,000,000. The campaign received \$16,000,000 in dimes and dollars last year.

Pointing out that 1946 produced the second largest infantile paralysis epidemic in the history of the United States with more than 25,000 cases, O'Connor said "it is going to take real money to do a job and do it well."

The 1946 sweep of polio, second only to the epidemic of 1916, following three years in which the disease also took a heavy toll, emphasized, O'Connor said, the need for an epidemic reserve of at least \$5,000,000.

The foundation, which shares funds collected in each area on an equal basis, carries on, besides treatment of those stricken with the disease, a broad program of research and education, the total cost amounting to approximately \$6,000,000, which is operated through grants to leading medical and scientific institutions.

Roseburg and Douglas County chapters will retail 50 per cent of the funds raised for emergency needs of local cases arising during the year.

Truman Urges Congress To Revise Labor Laws (Continued from Page One)

on telephone bills, furs, luggage, liquor, etc. — now due to expire July 1.

Other major points in his message:

1. **VETERANS.** Except for minor adjustments, the "program of benefits for veterans is now complete."

2. **FOREIGN AFFAIRS.** The United States will continue to stick to a policy of upholding principles of international justice. It will not "retreat to isolationism" nor sacrifice vital principles to gain peace treaty settlements.

3. **MILITARY AFFAIRS.** The United States proposes to remain strong until a "system of collective security under the United Nations" has been established. Then it will be willing to lead in collective disarmament.

4. **AGRICULTURE.** The next two years must be used to maintain and develop markets for farm production so that the country will not fall to meet problems of surpluses such as followed the first world war.

5. **HOUSING.** An "aggressive" program to encourage home construction is essential. Congress should enact "comprehensive" housing legislation which would permit improved housing in rural areas and the building, over a 4-year period, of 500,000 units of public low-rental housing.

6. **HEALTH.** Mr. Truman asked a broad national health program which would assure "adequate medical care to all who need it," financed by its beneficiaries.

7. **PRICES.** It is up to industry to "hold the line on existing prices" and even make who profits justify that. It is up to labor not to press for "unjustified wage increases" that will force the price level up. It is up to government to encourage high production which leads to good wages, low prices and reasonable profits.

8. **NATURAL RESOURCES.** The program of developing America's great river systems should be "pushed with full vigor."

9. **MONOPOLY.** Anti-trust laws will be enforced vigorously. This must be supplemented by "positive measures of aid to new enterprises." Decentralization of industry needs "special attention."

10. **ATOMIC ENERGY.** Mr. Truman called again for effective international control, voicing a "fervent hope" that military significance of atomic power will decline steadily so it may be turned into a peacetime "blessing for all nations."

11. **INTERNATIONAL RELIEF.** New legislation is needed to bring into the United States more of the "thousands of homeless and suffering refugees of all faiths."

12. **INTERNATIONAL TRADE.** America must continue to strive for a trade system as free as possible from obstructions.

13. **CIVIL RIGHTS.** Recommendations will be made later on tightening up the laws to protect civil rights of citizens.

Cautions Against Penalty
Mr. Truman cautioned congress against adoption of "punitive legislation" against labor and added:

"We must not, in order to punish a few labor leaders pass vindictive laws which restrict the proper rights of the rank and file of labor."

"We must not under the stress of emotion, endanger our American freedom by taking ill-considered action which leads to results not anticipated or desired."

Republican leaders of the new congress already have proposed a number of labor bills ranging from reenactment of the Case bill vetoed by President Truman last year to measures which would ban strikes in such essential industries as utilities and coal mining.

"But the president said the prospect of disagreement between his Democratic administration and the Republican congress on some domestic issues 'is not to be feared' since it is 'inherent in our form of government.'"

"The congress and the president, during the next two years, must work together," Mr. Truman said.

Men who differ, the president said, can still work together sincerely "for the common good."

He added:

"We shall be risking the nation's safety and destroying our opportunities for progress if we do not settle any disagreements in this spirit without thought of partisan advantage."

Juvenile Faults Over-Emphasized, Mails Declares

Juvenile delinquency is being made an unnecessarily big issue throughout the country, J. Walter Mails, famous "speedballer" of American baseball in a past era, said yesterday.

Mails, known in the baseball world as "Walter the Great," is now serving as western field director with the American Red Cross, touring eight states of the Pacific coast sector lecturing and entertaining disabled veterans at the various hospitals.

"You can't tell me that 75 per cent of all the children in the country aren't good ones. Too much is being said about this delinquency problem and not enough is actually being done," he said.

The San Francisco-born ex-marine of World War II emphasized the need of the right leaders for recreation in every city in America, but at the same time stressed education before athletics.

A strong recreation leader in the Bay City, Mails said that boys and girls without a complete high school education in this age just won't find work within a few years. He added that in San Francisco the younger set without a high school diploma have

become the major problem of the city's delinquency.

Greatly interested in the care and welfare of disabled veterans, Mails spent several hours Saturday and Sunday at the Veterans Hospital in Roseburg relating baseball yarns and performing imitations before the hospitalized ex-servicemen.

Tonight at 7:30 Mails will present an outlined program of the American Red Cross for 1947 to the Roseburg ARC board of directors. The public is invited.
