Holy Land Split in Two States Planned

LONDON, Jan. 7. (AP)—Foreign Secretary Bevin and Colonial Secretary Jones were reported today to have "decided in principle" that partition of Palestine into Arab and Jewish states was Britain's only hope of settling the Holy Land problem.

While the colonial and foreign offices studied what this informant called "several variations on the partition theme," the British government received an appeal from Hagana, most moderate of Jewish underground organizations in Palestine, to shun any "large-scale retaliatory operations in the Holy Land."

The British cabinet expected to consider Palestine proposals Thursday. An atmosphere of urgency was heightened by the steady flow of British soldiers, veterans of North African desert warfare, from Egypt into Palestine, where London sources have predicted a large scale offensive to crush Jewish underground resistance.

Moshe Shertok, political head of the Jewish agency, told a news conference world Jewry would revert to its old demand—creation of a Jewish state encompassing all Palestine. He said world Jewry's attempts to approach the Palestine problem constructively by reducing its demands had met with "no positive response," and urged Britain to denounce any intention to im-

pose the Morrison Plan upon the Holy Land.
