Recently we celebrated all over the world, communion. Jesus might have instituted some other plan rather than the Lord's supper by which He was to be remembered by His own. He might have chosen something emblematic of Bethlehem, or given a table of new commandments for the new kingdom, or he might have wished that the resurrection itself should ever be in the mind of His disciples together with the promise of the life that should endess be. But He passed over these things. There was no ray from Bethlehem's star, no strain of angel chorus, no command from a new Sinai, no fragment of broken stone from Joseph's tomb. New 'Case Labor Bill' Introduced in House

some respects, but still protect their right to strike, assemble peacefully, and picket peacefully.

7. Deprive labor organizations that engage in sympathy and jurisdictional strikes of their exclusive bargaining rights and make them liable for civil damages. Individual union members would not be affected.

8. Authorize suits by and against labor unions.

9. Require all national unions to supply members with annual statements on finances, officers and obligations.

10. Forbid political contribu-

tions by labor organizations, corporations, and national banks.

11. Grant congressional recognition of the right of various states to enact laws to ban closed-shop agreements.

12. Authorize the attorney-general alone to use injunctions in "flagrant cases of boycott, secondary strikes and combinations to fix prices or restrict production."

Case said this last provision would let the government protect public interest without opening the door to "indiscriminate use of injunctive process by private employers."

Fresh from a conference with CIO leaders, Senator James Murray (D-Mont.) said today that if congress passes "drastic labor legislation" it will create "serious bitterness and conflict."

On the other hand, he said, if no "restrictive, penalizing legislation" is enacted:

"I think that labor and management can get together and work out their differences without a serious wave of strikes."

Murray told a reporter he was host at a small dinner last night, attended by CIO President Philip Murray, four or five other CIO men, and several Democrat senators.

"We plan to meet with the AFL separately later," he added.

Murray, who was last year's chairman of the senate labor committee now headed by Senator Taft (R-Ohio), explained the purpose of last night's meeting was to get the CIO's general views on economic, social, and labor problems.

He said the CIO leaders appeared to regard President Truman's labor program as "very fair and reasonable, and they would be glad to sit down and

consider it. They didn't indorse each proposal specifically, but thought it was something that should be studied."

PORTLAND, Jan. 9. — (AP) — Mrs. Margaret Durant, about 45, was fatally injured last night when struck by an automobile which police reported was driven by Roland B. Ambrose, 53. Sheriff's Officer G. Stackhouse reported another pedestrian walking behind the woman said the Ambrose car attempted to avoid the accident and crashed into a telephone pole. Ambrose was injured in the chest as his steering wheel broke.
