Three-Year Tax Evasion Charged to Salem Man

PORTLAND, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Edward Stortz, Salem, posted \$3,500 bond and was released yesterday after arrest on a Federal Grand jury indictment charging tax evasion.

The government accuses Stortz of failure to report correct net income in 1942, 1943 and 1944. The 1942 count involves a report of net income of \$2,981 for which Stortz paid taxes of \$320. The government claims his income was \$24,336 that year and his tax should have been \$3,889.

Eight Poles Will Die for 'Treason'

WARSAW, Jan. 14.—(AP)—A Polish military tribunal today sentenced Count Kowary Grocholski and two other men to death for high treason on charges they were members of an organization Sunday sought to overthrow the Warsaw government by force.

During the trial, one of the defendants testified that the British ambassador to Poland had received state and military secrets from the underground organization, known as WIN.

Condemned with Grocholski were Waldemar Baczak, 24, former employee of the Polish foreign ministry, and Capt. Witold Kalicki, 36, of the Interior Security Corps.

Christina Kosciorek, 22, the fourth defendant, was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment. Another military court sentenced to death five members of the NSZ underground organization on charges of attacking the Krakow prison last August and freeing 80 political prisoners. Five others were given long prison terms.

Paul Bendele, Reedsport Meat Dealer, Passes Away

Paul Bendele, Reedsport meat packer and retail meat dealer, who has been in failing health for a number of months, died Sunday in a Eugene hospital. The remains were brought to Unger's Funeral parlors, Reedsport. Services will be held Wednesday from St. Ann's Catholic Church, with interment in the Reedsport cemetery.

Mr. Bendele was born in Alsace-Lorraine, France, January 21, 1882, and came to the United States 34 years ago. He located in Reedsport about 22 years ago and established a retail meat market and later established and operated the Umpqua Packing Co.

He is survived by his widow, Marie, and two sons, Paul, Jr., and Gerard. The sons recently took over operation of the wholesale and retail meat businesses from their father.
