Fall-Spawning Rainbow Trout Eggs Collected

Collections of eggs from fall-spawning rainbow brood stocks held in the trout hatcheries of the Oregon State Game Commission were begun in December. To date approximately two million have been taken from fish held at the Roaring River Hatchery near Seilo. It is anticipated that the total take at this station will run close to three and one-half million.

At other stations the following numbers have been taken to date: Oak Springs Hatchery—at Maupin, 900,000; Rock Creek Hatchery in Douglas county, 1,300,000; Klamath Hatchery, 400,000. It is anticipated that total collections of eggs from these fish will run around eight million.

Trio Arraigned at Reedsport; Fine of \$100 Levied on One

REEDSPORT—Thomas K. Collins, owner of the Commercial Hotel here, was arrested by Sgt. Dick Miles of the state police Monday night on a vagrancy charge involving association with notorious characters.

Collins pleaded guilty after police investigation revealed that it was his automobile in which Eugene Alma Keyes and Clarence Jennings Woodard, arrested for carrying concealed weapons, traveled here from North Bend last Saturday.

Following his plea of guilty, Justice of the Peace Fred M. Wright fined Collins \$100 and costs and paroled him from a six-month jail sentence. He paid the respective amounts.

Records of City Recorder Irving Johnson, state license agent, show that Woodard had purchased a 1947 license for Collins' car.

Woodard and Keyes were returned to Reedsport from Coquille Tuesday by state police officers and arraigned on charges of carrying concealed weapons. Keyes entered a plea of guilty. Sentence was postponed, as he was returned to the custody of the officers pending further identification.

When Woodard was arraigned, he stated that he had employed an attorney and wished time for the attorney to appear in his behalf. The time was granted and he was returned to the custody of the officers until his next hearing. Bail was set at \$2,000 each for Woodard and Keyes.
