Suggestions for Planning Social Activities Given

Here are a few suggestions that might help in planning community and social activities for this year or might be useful to any kind of organization in which its members wish to keep alert and active.

Party Plans—Go ahead and make preparation for our parties and social gatherings. Rather spontaneously and then we search frantically for ideas—why not have something ready to pull out of the hat? How shall this be done? Spend an evening checking through last year's magazines and clip articles with ideas for parties, favors, decorations, refreshments and games. As time goes along, make a habit of saving these articles that interest you and put them in a scrap book envelope, folder, or file. Then they will be ready at a minute's notice.

A Bulletin Board?—Make it a portable one and give it a permanent location in your club house or meeting hall. Have someone responsible for it for a given period of time. You will want to have on it TODAY'S EVENTS AND COMING EVENTS. You may want to post schedules, maps, programs, pictures, press clippings, book lists, a brief stunt, game, riddle, good joke to take home, or a timely cartoon.

How About a Poster?—A poster is an effective way of reaching your people. Sometimes your poster may be in letter form. Large or small, here are some ideas on poster making: (1) Brevity is the keynote of any poster sign or notice. (2) Size, large enough to attract attention. (3) Color always adds interest. (4) Plan your poster on scratch paper first. (5) Make a tour of the five and ten for cardboard, wood, or gummed letter sets, paints and crayons. (6) Write your message lightly in pencil, brush letter over the traced words, heavy strokes down, light strokes up. (7) A supply of odds and ends are invaluable for poster making—bits of cloth, string, cut-outs, ribbons, pipe cleaners, greeting cards. (8) The right information is a must on your poster. Let it answer What? When? Who? Where? and maybe Why? and How Much?
