early spring, but the board is withholding a call for bids pending outcome of federal legislation which might make federal aid obtainable.

A major expansion program is necessary at the Senior High School, he reported. Ellison also called attention to the necessity of increasing the budget to provide proper maintenance of the district's schools. The budget has been increased \$85,000 each year for the past two years, he said, the amount of increase alone being equal to prewar budgets.

His report was supplemented by Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott, who pointed out that the district employed 47 teachers in 1944, 65 in 1945 and now hires 76.

The current school census, not yet complete, has more than 2,400 children listed, he said, indicating increasing growth of the community.

School discipline is difficult, he said, because of lack of cooperation by parents.

Mayor Pledges Action—Mayor Al Flegel, declaring that it is not the plan of the city council to "set the world on fire," pledged the city administration to aggressive policies and promised there would be no "buck passing."

Declaring that individuals and groups in Roseburg had developed a habit of saying "No" automatically to every request, Flegel urged that "we learn to say 'Yes' once in a while."

It is necessary to do away with the heavy rush of business his department now faces when the license expire every two years on the same day.

Farrell said he might submit a bill to adopt the birthday system for renewing car licenses.

School Fund Dole Mapped—The house education committee voted yesterday to introduce a bill to distribute the \$15,000,000 basic school support fund which was voted by the people last November.

Rep. Lyle D. Thomas, Dallas, committee chairman, said the committee would work to get the bill passed as early in the session as possible. The bill provides \$50 per year of state support for each school census child. The bill will provide for the following distribution:

\$500,000 for school administration.

\$7,000,000 on a teacher pupil basis, with \$450 for each teacher, and the rest of the \$7,000,000 on the average daily attendance basis.

\$1,000,000 for transportation on the basis of one cent per mile for each pupil.

\$8,000,000 on the basis of need. This formula will be worked out. The equalization aid or feature will provide money to those school districts which are determined to need the money most desperately.

All of the money will be distributed to school districts as provided in the law passed in November. That law, however, provided that the legislature must work out the formula for distributing it.

Reforestation Plan Liked—Rep. John R. Snellstrom, Eugene, chairman of the forestry sub-committee of the House Natural Resources Committee, said that lumbermen approve the general principle of the proposal by Governor Snell for reforestation of the Tillamook burn.

Snellstrom said, however, that

lumbermen in general believe the proposal should not be limited to the Tillamook burn, but should be made a statewide program.

He said there would be opposition to a severance tax on timber if it were used for other purposes than reforestation.

The governor said it would cost \$6,000,000 to reestablish the 300,000-acre Tillamook burn as a state forest. Snell recommended a severance tax of 20 cents per thousand feet on all timber or stumpage cut in the state, the money to be used for the Tillamook burn and for a general fire suppression and prevention program.

The tax would raise \$12,000,000 in 10 years.

Law Change Planned—Changes in the brand law which are made necessary because of modern marketing methods will be considered by the Senate Livestock Committee, Sen. J. N. Jones, Juntura, committee chairman, said.

One of the principal objectives will be to tighten control of cattle passing through sales rings, Jones said. The proposed new law will require brand inspection of cattle handled at the sale.

Disease Reports Wanted—A bill to require doctors to report to the secretary of state all cases of epilepsy and other diseases which might cause unconsciousness will be introduced by the house committee on medicine, pharmacy and dentistry.

The secretary of state would use the information as grounds to deny issuance of driver's licenses.

bility in any action, present or future, for failure to pay for activities commonly understood not to constitute work. But the employer would remain liable for activities which he had agreed was work for pay.

3. Relieve employers similarly for acts done in good faith, relying on rulings by the administrator of the wage-hour act.

4. Authorize compromises of claims under the act and validate compromises already made. The supreme court decision ruled out such settlements.

5. Make awards of damages, in present or future actions, discretionary with the court if it finds the employer did not act in good faith. Under the wage-hour, employees may claim triple the amount of actual compensation involved.

6. Put a short-term limitation on starting actions to enforce claims under the act.
