WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Rep. Shafer (R-Mich.) yesterday asserted Undersecretary of State William L. Clayton is making "millions misusing American tax money" and demanded his dismissal.

In a House speech, Shafer also said "my research proves to me" that Undersecretary of State Dean Acheson "has learned well how to feather his own nest while serving in a public post."

He added he hopes that General George C. Marshall, incoming secretary of state, will "clean house of these men who are using public posts for private gain." Shafer said he was withholding a resolution, calling for a congressional investigation, to see what Marshall will do.
