Bobby Feller's New Salary Equals Babe Ruth Record

NEW YORK, Jan. 22. (AP)—Bobby Feller has signed for an estimated \$80,000 salary for 1947, which ties Babe Ruth's top wages, but when it comes to take-home pay, the superb slinger of the Indians is still far back of the great Bambino, who used to take it in carload lots.

For the Babe made his \$80,000 in 1930-31 when the buck was still a buck. According to the Monterey experts, Ruth's real earnings on that per annum wage would be about the equivalent of a \$150,000 salary today.

Besides, the Babe made a huge on movies, barnstorming, ghosted articles, endorsements and what have you? In 1930, for instance, he collected \$130,000 from all his enterprises.

Feller, too, has a good eye towards the dollar and has picked up his share in extra-curricular events. The major league's strike-out king recently estimated his total 1946 earnings "between \$65,000 and \$100,000. He received \$45,000 in actual straight salary, another \$25,000 in bonus payments and the rest in endorsements and barnstorming.

Although no actual figures were announced, President Bill Veech of the Indians said that Feller's contract contained six bonus clauses, all based on attendance figures. It was believed that his base salary called for "about \$50,000." Ruth's \$80,000, incidentally, was a straight salary.

George F. Jones, Roseburg Resident 26 Years, Dies

George Forrest Jones, 68, resident of Roseburg for 26 years, died yesterday evening at the home of his sister, Mrs. J. E. Thiele, in Yoncalla. He was born April 22, 1878, in Oakland, Oregon. He moved to Yoncalla and then to Hood River for a short time, before coming here to reside in 1921.

His wife preceded him in death in 1942. Due to ill health, he moved last August to his sister's home in Yoncalla.

Surviving are two sisters: Mrs. J. E. Thiele, Yoncalla, and Mrs. J. A. McGuire, Kirkland, Wash., and a brother, J. W. Jones, Lowell, Ore.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Roseburg Funeral Home Friday, Jan. 24, at 11 A.M., with Rev. H. P. Sweeney officiating. Interment will be in the Odd Fellows Cemetery.

Abolition of Horse-Dog Race Betting Demanded

PORTLAND, Jan. 22. (AP)—Petitions asking that horse and dog race betting be eliminated in Oregon were distributed today to

the state's pastors, Parent-Teacher Associations, Granges, and other clubs.

Walter S. Klein, chairman of a committee against legalized gambling, said the petitions would be presented to the legislature. Recently the Portland council of churches and a group of merchants took the same anti-betting stand.
