Revision of Farm Support Plan Urged By Secy. Anderson

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson suggested today that the government's promise to support farm prices be revised to avoid a possible outlay of more than \$2,000,000,000 and wasteful overproduction.

Any changes should be made, he said, only by mutual consent of farmers and the government. In a statement presented to the House Agriculture Committee, Anderson said the price-support commitment, which runs to the end of 1948, encourages production for a wartime pattern of demand.

"I am not suggesting for an instant," he said, "that we back down from the spirit of the government's commitments to farmers. That would be unthinkable. We would do better to pay the bill, whatever the cost, for that would still be a part of the cost of the war."

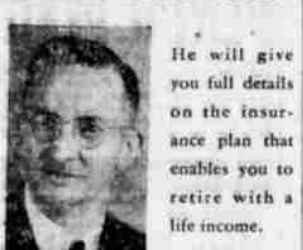
The secretary offered no specific proposals but said it is vital that his department, Congress and farmers join to prevent "waste in production, effort, money and soil." Anderson said he foresees no great difficulty with support programs this year because most commodities involved will stay above support levels throughout 1947.

"Trouble" Crops Listed
He forecast large outlays of government's promise to support port loans on non-perishable commodities and purchases of perishable products in 1948. Products which would give trouble under present legislation were listed as potatoes, eggs, poultry, wool, flaxseed, peanuts, fruits and vegetables, and cotton.

Anderson estimated it will cost \$100,000,000 next year for export subsidies on cotton alone. He explained that the purpose of the wartime support legislation was to assure farmers price and income protection during the post-war period of adjustment to a normal peacetime production. But as the legislation stands, he said, the "government seems committed to support prices of some commodities at a relative high and inflexible rate—a rate that acts as an incentive to increase production beyond needs with the result that resources are wasted and adjustments in the pattern of production are retarded."

Vets Spend Jobless Pay Usefully, Survey Shows

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—If the places where jobless war veterans cash their unemployment compensation checks is any measure, the American Legion said today, it appears that most of them spend the money usefully.

A one-state survey by the Legion's National Employment Committee showed that of 3,859 checks, 1,861 were cashed in banks, 457 in clothing or merchandise stores and 340 in food shops.

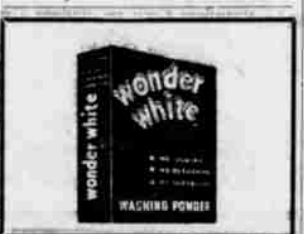
Well down the list with 270 checks cashed were pool halls, theaters and other places of amusement.

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Oregon Man Kidnaped, Robbed in Washington

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Jan. 23.—(AP)—Elton T. Silis, 61, Forest Grove, Ore., businessman, told Whatcom County sheriff's officers yesterday he was kidnaped by four young men on a downtown Bellingham street Tuesday night, driven beyond the city limits, beaten, robbed and forced from their car.

Silis, who had come here on a business trip, said he was approaching his hotel when a young man called him to a parked car at the curb. He was struck on the head, he said, and dragged into the auto.

He remembered little after that, he declared, until he appeared at a farmhouse more than two hours later and asked for help.

Silis, given medical attention at a local hospital for cuts on his mouth and chin, said \$16 and two wallets he carried are missing.

Judicial Problem

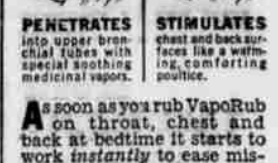

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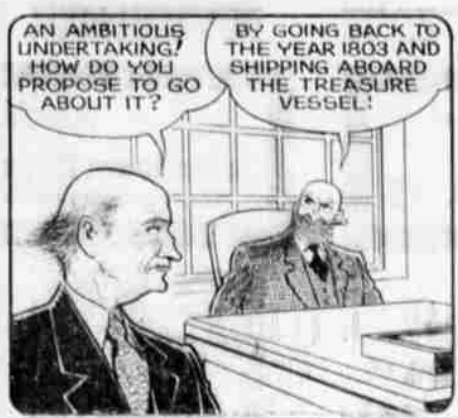
