Vets' Survivors Urged to Submit Benefit Claims

Carl D. Monroe, manager of the Eugene field office of the Social Security Administration, said today that many survivors of some 40,000 deceased war veterans will lose benefits due them unless they file necessary claims by Feb. 10.

The families in question are those of veterans who died after discharge but before Aug. 10, 1946. Such families who are not eligible for veterans compensation or pensions and who meet other requirements of the Social Security Act are entitled to insurance payments retroactive to the time of the veteran's death.

They will still be eligible for monthly payments after Feb. 10, but the retroactive benefits will be lost if application has not been made by then.

Families of veterans dying within three years after discharge are entitled to social Security payments, in keeping with legislation passed by the last Congress. In the case of deaths occurring after Aug. 9, 1946, the payments are retroactive to a maximum of three months prior to the date of application.

Social Security officials, Monroe said, have estimated that about 40,000 veterans died after their discharge and prior to Aug. 10, 1946, and their dependents are eligible for benefits. The survivors of any veteran who died prior to that time should write at once to the Social Security Administration office in Eugene, or see a Social Security representative at the office of the Oregon State Employment Service in Roseburg, Tuesday, Feb. 4, from 8:30 A. M. to noon.

The council, to be known as the Roseburg Veterans Hospital Council, elected Harpham as chairman. Another meeting is scheduled in the near future. Detailed plans for service and supplies are to be worked out.

Mother of Two Children Admits 2 Bank Holdups

DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 24. — (P) — An attractive 35-year-old mother of two teenage daughters was seized yesterday less than an hour after she staged a daring daylight holdup of a downtown bank using as a weapon a hypodermic

syringe filled with a mouthwash. Police Chief Brophy said the woman, Mrs. Opal Dixon, a waitress, signed a statement admitting the \$2,950 holdup of the Des Moines Bank & Trust company and also the \$582 armed holdup of the United Bank and Trust Co. in St. Louis last Dec. 26.

Brophy said Mrs. Dixon would be charged with bank robbery under Iowa state law which carries a mandatory life term upon conviction.

U. S. Nut Growers Ask Tariff Boost

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — (P) — Fifty per cent increase in the tariff on imported walnuts, Brazil nuts and cashews was asked by representatives of the United States edible tree nut industry at a committee meeting yesterday.

The committee, preparing data to be used by the State Department in negotiating trade treaties with 18 countries, was told by A. C. Jacobson, general manager of the Northwest Nut Growers, Dundee, Ore., that provision should be made for im-

port restrictions when domestic nut prices fall below parity. Jacobson said that in the year ended last August, imports of shelled almonds were 352 per cent of the prewar average and filberts, 425 per cent, despite increasing domestic production. Carlyle Thorne, manager of the California Walnut Growers Association, Los Angeles, said that imported Brazil nuts and cashews which grow wild and are harvested with peon or coole labor, compete with domestic tree nuts. He said that all tree nuts compete with each other.

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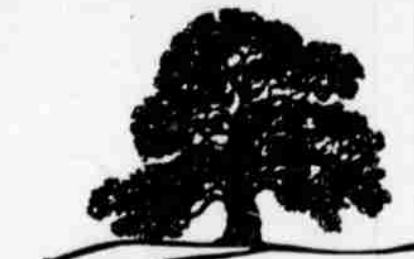


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
