Former Chrome Plant In Coos Sold to Co-Op

PORTLAND, Jan. 23. (AP)—Sale of the former chrome reduction plant near Coquille to the Coquille Valley Co-operative of Bandon for \$14,120 was approved today by the war assets administration.

The Bandon group was high bidder among six seeking the plant which includes the main separator building with a ground area of 8740 square feet, laboratory, office building, warehouse and 16 smaller structures having an aggregate floor space of 2900 feet.

The WAA said the co-operative would use the property as a central distributing point for hay, agricultural lime and fuel. It said other co-operatives which would use part of the facilities include Arago Co-operative Cheese Association, Coos River Farmers' Co-operative, Coos Curry Feed Co-operative and the Coos County Livestock Marketing Association.

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Un-American Quiz Aimed at Schools, Labor, Hollywood

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. (AP)—The House Committee on Un-American Activities, meeting for the first time under Republican management, voted yesterday to investigate communist or subversive influences in Hollywood, labor unions, national defense, and the educational system.

Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R-N.J.) told reporters:

"Let the chips fall where they may. It doesn't make any difference to me whether they fall on the Columbians, on the Ku Klux Klan, or the Communists."

This is the program Thomas said the committee approved:

1. To expose and ferret out Communists and their sympathizers in the federal government.

2. To spotlight Communist domination of some vital labor unions.

3. To begin a counter educational program against subversive propaganda, using official reports at regular intervals.

4. To focus attention on groups and movements trying to dissipate our "atomic bomb know-how for the benefit of a foreign power" and on those seeking to weaken other phases of national security.

5. To give a "good airing" to "Communist influences in Hollywood."

6. To pay prompt attention to the Communist element in the educational system.

Number one man on the committee staff will be Robert E.

Stripling. He will be clerk and chief investigator.

Stripling, 34, served the committee in various capacities from the time it was set up in 1938. Crafted into the Army in January, 1945, he taught aviators in intensive activities to agents of the counter-intelligence corps.

In response to a question, Thomas said the "Hollywood situation probably will result in a public hearing."

Committee representatives have gone to Hollywood twice in recent months. Their report never has been released.

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
