FEE ON LICENSES

Dealers in sporting goods would be authorized to collect a fee of 25 cents for each hunting or angling license issued at their places of business under the terms of a bill introduced at the current session of the state legislature.

Several years ago hunting and fishing licenses were issued only by county clerks. But in more recent years persons and firms handling tackle and equipment have been made agents.

But issuance of licenses has become burdensome. Much time must be taken away from business to handle applications and write permits.

In 1935 fishing licenses issued by the state numbered 76,984. In 1945, the last full year for which figures are available, 1946 records still being incomplete, angling licenses totalled 175,552, an increase of 98,568.

It becomes quite obvious that the task of issuing more than 175,000 licenses annually involves a great deal of time and work. If returned to the supervision of county clerks exclusively, the burden of cost would fall upon taxpayers of the several counties, as county clerks would be required to employ additional help.

It is contended that any license purchaser would pay for the convenience of buying his license through his dealer, and if he did not choose to pay the extra fee, he could procure the license without additional charge through the office of the county clerk.

It would seem that a 25-cent charge on a \$3 license is a rather excessive rate, although it is a comparatively small amount when convenience is considered.
