Yeggmen Fail

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 27. —(AP)—Burglars figuratively "laid" dozens of eggs in an unsuccessful attempt to crack a meat store safe.

Lacking drills, the burglars attacked the strongbox with meat cleavers but were able only to knock off the safe's combination. They left after breaking several dozen eggs and scattering them on the floor.

Deadliest Period For Auto Drivers Opened, Warning

Secretary of State Farrell warns drivers that the state is entering the deadliest weeks of the year for highway users. "Mile for mile, mid-winter brings natural hazards to motorists to their most dangerous level," Farrell said. "Those who think this is a routine safety blurb should check the death record. Last February's death rate was double that of June."

State and national records for years past reflect with high consistency this trend. Authorities point to poor visibility and slippery road surfaces as principal danger factors. Visibility is adversely affected not only by bad weather but also by long hours of darkness.

Oregon's death rate, based on the number of highway fatalities for every hundred million miles of travel, was 6.8 last June. During February it had been 13.8, or exactly double.

In this connection Farrell reiterated his advice to "start winter trips early."

What Figures Show
Oregon's Traffic Accident Facts for last year shows that 30 per cent of this state's road mishaps occurred on wet, snowy, and icy road surfaces, according to Farrell.

"In several typical snow belt states nearly 65 per cent of all December, January, and February wrecks occurred on snow-covered or ice-coated surfaces," Farrell said.

In Oregon the number of deaths per miles traveled was double in February as compared to the June figure last year. The tendency for winter risks to far exceed those of summer months has persisted over a period of years. Major winter hazards are inadequate traction and reduced visibility.

"When starting out on a non-dry surface, get the feel" of the road by trying your brakes while driving slowly and when no other vehicles are near," Farrell advised. "Even when roads may appear to be clear, remember that bridges or shaded sections may present icy patches."

Millions Travel To Monument Top In Washington

WASHINGTON—From the day it was opened to the public in October 1955 until now, more than 21,000,000 people have traveled to the top of the Washington Monument, either by foot which costs nothing, or by elevator which costs 10c.

Nearly a million people a year take in the vast view of the nation's capital and vicinity from the peak of the monument yearly, but few could tell you who its architect was.

Robert Mills, born at Charleston, S. C., designed the shaft. A distinguished engineer and writer, he was reputedly an exceedingly popular figure in society in his day.

Grave Long Neglected
Mills died in March 1855, but it was not until about 10 years ago that his grave in the old Congressional Cemetery here even had a marking. All the man at the cemetery could say was that the stone had been purchased by "some architects' society."

The architect came to Washington in 1830. He had some professional instruction from James Hoban, architect of the White House, and he received some assistance from his friend Thomas Jefferson, whose guest he was at Monticello for two years.

Andrew Jackson appointed Mills architect of public build-

ings—a position which he held for 15 years—1836 to 1851.

Mills was the first plan for the obelisk which is now famed around the world. It was selected from a competition conducted by the Washington National Monument Society, whose first president was Chief Justice Marshall.

Cost \$1,187,110
Work on the monument was begun in 1848 but was suspended from 1854 to 1880. Dedication was on Saturday, Feb. 21, 1885, and the structure was opened to the public in October.

The monument cost \$1,187,110, of which the National Washington Monument Society raised \$500,000 by private subscription. The remainder of the sum was provided by congressional appropriation.

The obelisk is 555.5 feet high, has 888 steps and its cap consists of the largest piece of aluminum ever cut up to the day it was set, Dec. 6, 1884.

Money Savings in Food Buys Listed By Nutritionist

Best buys in Oregon at present are potatoes, carrots, apples, onions, turnips, fruit juice, and 20-pound turkeys because they are plentiful, according to Lucy A. Case, extension nutritionist of Oregon State College, in a report on food and eating.

Buying foods at the height of the season and knowing a variety of ways in which to prepare plentiful foods are other ways of cutting the budget, Miss Case states. "One can avoid extravagant last minute purchases by writing menus ahead of time and making shopping lists."

Advisability of buying in quantities will depend upon storage facilities, whether the family will use that product more extravagantly and whether the homemaker has enough money on hand.

In Corvallis, the nutritionist said, a person may save 4.1 cents per pound by purchasing a 100-pound sack of potatoes rather than a 10-pound sack. A nine-pound sack of oatmeal is sold at a saving of 7.9 cents per pound compared to the one-pound box. Other foods having appreciable savings in large quantities are fruit juice, peanut butter, flour, apples, onions, salad oil, soda crackers and salt.

Reading labels also helps the homemaker save money and insure her family of quality food, Miss Case said. Federal and Oregon law require all labels to contain true statements about net content and ingredients.

Mrs. Lucy Amanda Hays Of Glangary Passes On

Lucy Amanda Hays, 83, resident of Douglas county for 40 years, died at her home at Glangary Sunday afternoon, after a long period of ill health. Born April 19, 1863, in Free Stone County, Texas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Green, she came West with her parents and settled in California, where she was married to James Henry Hays, at Santa Paula, in 1884.

Mr. and Mrs. Hays moved to Douglas county in 1907. Surviving are the widow, Mr. Hays; a daughter Mrs. Merle H. Doering, and a grandson, James Carl Doering, all of Glangary; also a sister, Mrs. Scott Perry, Oakridge, Ore., and a brother, Robert Green, San Jose, Calif.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with Father William Blaker, of St. George's Episcopal Church, officiating. Interment will follow in the Oak Creek cemetery.

Budget Director Defends Estimate Of Liquor Profits

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 27.—(AP)—Budget Director George Aiken Saturday defended his estimate of \$26,127,357 in liquor profits for the next two years, asserting the estimate is based on the assumption the profits would continue to be about the same as in the past few months.

The Liquor Commission's estimate for the next two years is \$11,000,000, and this discrepancy is the major factor in determining whether the state budget is balanced.

Aiken said the profit for the year ended last July 1 was \$9,741,774, and that sales increased 3.7 per cent in the past six months.

"We only assumed," Aiken said, "that the sales would for each of the next two fiscal years would equal that for the year 1945-46 which was \$42,039,531."

"In view of the large inventory on hand, it was estimated that a reduction in stocks could be made to the extent of \$7,500,000. This reduction, plus the profits to be realized on the volume of sales estimated, and the income from the license privilege taxes amounting to \$1,650,000, will make available for the public welfare commission the \$26,127,357 shown in the budget."

Aiken said he did not consider that sales might increase because of larger population.

Woman Teaches Law at Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Mrs. Soia Mentschikoff, a New York City attorney, becomes the first woman visiting professor in the history of exclusively masculine Harvard Law School in 1947.

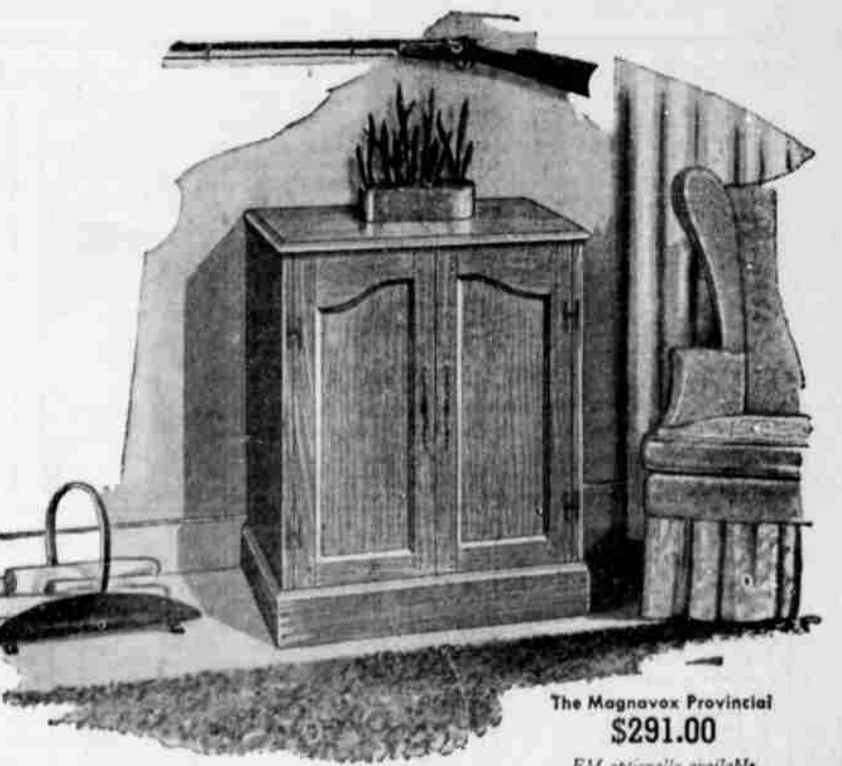
