112th Semi-Annual Statement of

Equitable Savings & Loan Association

First mortgage investments on northwest homes totaled a new high of \$24,649,171 for Equitable Savings and Loan association. Increased by more than \$7 1/2 million during 1946, mortgage investments now equal 77 per cent of the assets.

The most active financing year in the association's history accounted for Equitable loans of more than \$15 million in 1946. Every month averaged over \$1 million. The 1946 total exceeded 1945 loans by more than \$5 1/2 million. At the end of its 56th year in existence Equitable has loaned a grand total of more than \$125,000,000.

Assets have reached a new high of \$32,145,083, showing an increase of \$4,748,602 during 1946.

Certificate deposits gained over \$3 million, bringing total deposit investments to \$27,925,693. Maturity value of savings certificates purchased during 1946 amounted to \$3,433,050, 25 per cent more than the previous year's \$10 million high. Certificates matured and paid last year amounted to \$1,741,719. Total certificates matured and paid since Equitable was founded in 1890 is \$69,600,000.
