Missing Witness In Tatum Killing Eludes Searchers

PORTLAND, Jan. 27. (AP)—A piano player who disappeared from a night spot after Ship Capt. Frank R. Tatum was taken from the club by his death remained missing today.

A report that Lee Frank Butler, who reportedly witnessed a beating administered to Tatum in the unlicensed Cecil Club Jan. 14, had been seen at Albany, Ore., failed to lead to the man's whereabouts. Another report that the musician had planned to go see an ill son was disproved by the fact that he has not reached his home town of Anaconda, Mont. Meanwhile District Attorney McCourt ordered another autopsy to establish cause of death of the Billerica, Mass., officer which resulted in a club operator and his two young henchmen being charged with murder.

McCourt said one of the three accused men told of one of the trio jumping on Tatum's head as the captain lay on the floor of the Cecil Club after a fight. Earlier an autopsy report indicated Tatum died of a broken neck when thrown from a 50-foot embankment.

Detective Capt. James Purcell, Jr., reported today tips to police indicated Butler, the Cecil Rooms Club pianist who apparently witnessed the beating, had been seen at Albany, Ore., where he was overheard mentioning a trip to Weed, Calif.

Butler was last seen here at the Central bus depot Jan. 24, in company of a blonde girl. Accused of the slaying of Tatum are Patrick Raymond, 40, owner of the club, John Snyder, 20, and Harold Schorn, 25. Police said the younger men confessed carrying Tatum from the club at the command of Raymond.

Accumulated Lumber at Eugene Starts Moving

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 27. (AP)—The lumber stacks, piled for months on loading platforms of this region's sawmills, are beginning to decline at last. The easing of the freight car shortage has enabled more lumber to be shipped. Other contributing factors are the resumption of water shipping from Coos Bay, tied up for months last year by a jurisdictional dispute, and the usual cold-weather decline in logging.

G. P. Wilcox and R. A. Austin, Riddle and E. S. Canton, Drain, will head up a delegation of Douglas county lumbermen who will journey to Portland this week to attend the annual meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, January 30-31.

Oregon's United States Senator Wayne L. Morse will be principal speaker at a banquet, Thursday, January 30, at the Multnomah Hotel. He will discuss trends in labor legislation.

The two-day session has been expanded into a congress of West Coast forest industries and is the first post-war meeting of the
