

Teachers' Pay Demand Given to Legislature

advised their legislative delegation they don't like the bill to distribute the \$16,000,000 annual basic state school support fund because it would give Multnomah county only \$2,700,000 a year. They think they ought to have \$4,000,000, so the Multnomah legislators will hold a hearing on the bill Thursday.

Prisons, Jails Rapped

The legislative interim committee on prisons, jails and state institutions had severe criticism of those institutions in its final report, but said the evils could be cured by more funds and more public awareness of the problems. The committee said the state

institutions are "over-crowded, ill-equipped and under-financed," and that county and city jails "suffer from age, poverty and inefficiency."

It said children in state institutions are "shamefully neglected," and said the net result of the serious conditions at all the institutions is added cost to the taxpayer because of the failure to rehabilitate the inmates.

Moving the state penitentiary and building an institution for delinquent women were recommended.

For War on Starlings

It always will be open season on European Starlings if the legislature passes the Senate Game Committee's bill, introduced yesterday.

The bill adds the bird (Sturnus vulgaris) to the list of birds on

which there is no closed season. The bird recently has become a menace to farmers.

The Senate Labor and Industries Committee voted to introduce six bills for the State Unemployment Compensation Commission. One would eliminate charges against employers' experience rating accounts in cases where employees quit without cause, are fired for misconduct or refuse to take other employment after a layoff.

Boys Camps Proposed

A bill to provide for boys camps, based on Governor Snell's proposal, was introduced by the Senate County Affairs committee.

Boards of county commissioners or city councils could establish such camps by agreement with the forestry service.

Courts handling juvenile delinquency cases would commit boys between 12 and 18 years of age to such camps. The sponsoring groups would set up the training, discipline and instructional programs for the camps, and the board of control would provide support on the basis of \$50 a month per boy.

Meanwhile, the House Social Welfare Committee is studying the proposal, too, and a sub-committee has been named to arrange a date when the committee can inspect the two sites recommended by the State Forestry Department.

They are located at Timber in northwest Oregon, and at the state arboretum at Camp Adair near Corvallis.

The House committee on state and federal affairs tabled a memorial to ask Congress not to increase immigration quotas.

A public hearing on the bill providing that county assessors collect taxes, instead of sheriffs, will be held next Monday by the House Assessment and Taxation Committee.

Sales Tax Interest Low
Legislative proposals to enact a retail sales tax have failed to arouse much public interest, judging by the legislators' mail.

Most of the legislators said they haven't received any mail, either for or against.

Rep. Marie Wilcox, Grants Pass, said the Rogue River Valley grange, which claims to be the largest in the state, advised her it is almost unanimous for the tax.

Rep. Earl Hill, Cushman, said he has received 15 letters, all of them wanting it.

The House passed and sent to the Senate yesterday a resolution to transfer Sodaville mineral springs in Linn county from jurisdiction of the State Board of Control to the State Parks division of the Highway commission. The springs were given to the state in 1932.

A bill to prevent minors from entering any place where alcoholic beverages are sold was introduced by Rep. Harvey, Portland.

The bill presumably would prevent minors from going into grocery stores or any other place which sold beer or wine.

Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland Democrat, introduced a bill to establish the minimum old age pension at \$70 a month. The average now is \$45.

Basketball Star Knifed To Death in Scuffle
EL PASO, Ill., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Edward P. (Bud) Bennett, 15, El Paso township High School basketball star, was stabbed fatally last night in a fight involving four players and four other youths.

Sheriff Wallace Melner said he had arrested four youths who were holding him in jail without charge. He said they denied the killing.

Melner said the players declared the four youths with whom the basketball players were involved in the fight were "town bullies" and that the players had decided to "have it out with them" after losing a game last night.

The two groups met at a filling station, and during a scuffle, Bennett was stabbed in the heart, the sheriff said.

Allied Order Bans Birth Of Fresh Nazi Legends

NUERNBERG, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The Allies have determined to wash the names of Hitler's leaders out of print and their deeds out of mind so they never can contribute to new German legends, it was learned here today.

This policy has been adopted by the Allied Control Council in Berlin for Nazi leaders generally and specifically for the seven Nazis who were convicted with Hermann Goering, Joachim von Ribbentrop and others but were given only jail terms.

The order is that no news of any of the seven ever is to be divulged—that all their actions and comments are to be secret. The secrecy reportedly was advocated by the Soviet spokesman in Berlin. The Russians have long felt the best way for the people to forget any individual is by silence.

Mrs. Wallie Brown of Oakland Passes Away

Mrs. Wallie Brown, 79, resident of Oakland, Ore., died in Roseburg Monday following a long illness.

She was born Oct. 26, 1876, in Chicago, Ill., where she was married to Albert E. Brown, Oct. 15, 1890. Mr. and Mrs. Brown moved to Oakland from Blackhawk, S. D., two years ago.

Surviving are the husband; six sons, Walter E., Erban, and A. Brown, Grand Coulee, Wash.; George D. Brown, Chicago; Ralph G. and Harley A. Brown, Oakland; two daughters, Mrs. Grace E. Walton, Aurora, Ore., and Mrs. Edith M. Billings, Clinton, Iowa, and a foster son, Ernest Leonard, Oakland. She leaves 31 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2 P. M. Wednesday at the Community Church in Oakland, conducted by the Rev. J. K. Howard, with interment following in the L.O.O.F. Cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Election Pledge Broken, Poland Told by America
WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The United States today accused the present government of Poland of having "failed to carry out its solemn pledges" to hold free elections in the national voting on January 19.

The announcement said, however, the United States is not breaking relations with Poland at least for the time being.

This country, the statement said, is "retaining full liberty of action."

It accused the Polish provisional government of "widespread measures of coercion and intimidation against democratic elements."

More OPA Suits Ousted By Judge McCulloch
PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Five more OPA suits asking treble damages for alleged over-calling sales were dismissed yesterday by Federal Judge McCulloch.

The judge dismissed 11 similar suits a week ago, and Saturday announced that his court would no longer hear rent violation cases.

Defendants in the cases dismissed yesterday were Spencer Packing Co., Lebanon; Food Distributors Inc., Portland; Langlois Cheese Makers, Langlois; Green Brokerage, Roseburg, and Northwest Construction Co., Portland.

moral about it," Schwellenbach said.

5. Declared supervisory employees are entitled to organize and bargain collectively, provided that they do not belong to the same union as production employees, or a union dominated by such a production employees union.

6. Criticized the language of a proposal to make it easier to sue unions.

7. Urged that a provision to outlaw secondary boycotts be modified in line with President Truman's recommendations (to

exempt boycotts intended to protect wage rates and working conditions).

8. Asked for safeguards in a proposal requiring registration of labor organizations so as not to force creation of a new bureau in the Labor Department to handle them.

9. Declared that a substantial advance in industrial relations would be "destroyed" by enactment of legislation outlawing the closed shop, union shop and maintenance of union membership.

10. Opposed Ball's bill to ban industry-wide collective bargaining.

Schwellenbach said the bill assumes that local unions and local membership would be less anxious to have a strike than the heads of international organizations and that individual employers would be less anxious to have a strike than a group of employers organized together.

"My experience of this last year and a half has convinced me that that simply is not so," Schwellenbach said.

But our demand for more building assures activity."

Bank reports, MacNaughton Bank reports, MacNaughton are barely holding their own, indicating that the high cost of living is affecting the ability of the people to save money. But there still exists a great backlog of purchasing power in savings accounts and war bonds which will be used in business, "when people think prices are right to do business."

Some Savings Wasted
Bank studies, he said, show that savings accounts are held largely by people who had savings accounts prior to the war. Many people "wasted swollen war time earnings and are now living again from hand to mouth and complaining bitterly."

The only possible obstacles to continued prosperity, MacNaughton declared, are found in the possibility that Congress will "in an angry mood go to far with repressive labor laws, and thus create trouble," or, "that we may as a nation become involved in 'international scrapes.'"

Tobey Registers Kick
Senator Tobey (R., N. H.) yesterday called for "fewer favorite sons" in the Republican organization.

At the same time, however, he denied that he is kicking over party traces with any intent to upset GOP control of the Senate.

The New Hampshire senator—vocal defender of an unsuccessful Democratic battle last week to halt continuation of the War Investigating and Small Business Committees—told a reporter he is going along with the Republicans when he thinks they are right—but not at other times.

Tobey was one of four Republicans who voted against the two committees.

"I've been a Republican for nearly 45 years," he said. "I'm no bolter. But I'm jealous of my party. I want it to be as clean as a whistle. I want it to deserve the commendation of the country for its forthrightness."

In this connection, Tobey said he thinks there are "too many favorite sons" in the present GOP Senate organization.

He repeated charges he made on the floor last week that the two special committees had been set up primarily to give chairmanships to Senators Brewster

(R.-Me.), on the war investigating group and Wherry (R.-Neb.), on the Small Business Committee. Both of the latter denied this.
