Senator Morse to Ask Changes in Wagner Act

PENLETON, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon yesterday proposed that the Wagner act be amended to enlarge jurisdiction of the National Labor Relations board so it would have authority to check unfair labor practices as well as those of employers.

The senator in an address here said he would introduce amendments designed to do this.

"I will not vote for some of the extreme anti-labor measures now being considered," he said. "I do not propose to forget all the labor law I know and will not serve the public if I vote for vindictive legislation that will produce another cycle of labor unrest similar to that existing prior to the passage of the Wagner Act."

He deplored what he termed shortsightedness of some labor leaders who resorted to abusive policies and warned employers that "governmental legislation is a two-edged sword."

"I will fight cutting down the rights of both employers and labor by governmental compulsion," he declared.

Legal Bout

DETROIT, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Mrs. Gloria Lee Deane today had wrestled a divorce from her athlete husband, Raymond, whose knowledge of wrestling holds did not help him hold her.

Mrs. Deane told Circuit Judge Guy A. Miller yesterday that her husband frequently carried his college wrestling experience into their home life with "humiliating and painful" results.

"He'd clamp a headlock on me," she told the court, "and then slip into a hip lock and then try the flying mare and he'd toss me right across the room. I always lost."

Clothes Revision Order Eases Life Of WACS in Japan

TOKYO, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Enlisted WACS, the Cinderellas of Japan because they have to be in bed by midnight while their officer and civilian sisters continue to dance and play, brightened up today when the Army said they could wear good old civilian clothes on weekends.

Slacks and bobby socks in the daytime and formal at night from Saturday noon to Sunday midnight is the new order for the 700 enlisted WACS in the Tokyo-Yokohama area.

But they still have to be in by midnight, except on Saturday, unless they certify they are going to a private home or rest hotel.

It's quite a treat for the girls to wear civvies 36 hours each week in a foreign land where enlisted men and officers always must wear uniform. In dress, they now have equal rights with officer WACS.

Maj. Pauline V. Lynch, ranking WAC officer in Tokyo, said the enlisted WACS have been good soldiers who have done a normal amount of girding about regulations but have conformed with good grace.

Their morale is excellent, she said, and they have boosted that of the soldiers who welcome the little bit of America they represent.

The first WACS in this area arrived last fall. They live in the modern six-story Mitsubishi main building, and have Japanese maids to do the routine house-keeping. Male guests may be entertained in the big first floor lounge. The building is off-limits to officers.

Off duty there's plenty of recreation for the WACS at dining dances, teas and outings. And there are plenty of GIs to squire them about.

Ouster of OPA Rental Suits Will Be Appealed

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Grounds of OPA rental suits on dismissal "the war is over" will be appealed, the regional office of temporary controls—OPA attorney said Wednesday as nine more rent suits were filed.

Last week Federal Judge McCulloch dismissing a suit brought to force compliance with rent control regulations, said he would hear no more because the emergency price control act under which they are brought is based on existence of a war. He said he would no longer base decisions on the "fiction" that the war was still continuing.

Edwin U. Driscoll, Seattle, regional OTC-OPA attorney cautioned landlords not to take premature action, said an appeal would be taken, and filed suit against nine landlords charged with violating rent ceilings.

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Woman Held In Tatum Case Probe

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Police said today a woman friend of a club operator charged with murder had told of witnessing a prolonged argument and fight that preceded the death of ship's Captain Frank B. Tatum.

Detective Chief James Purcell reported the statement by Miss Sybil Willard was the "most sensational information" obtained in the week-long investigation.

She has been placed under \$1,000 bond and will be a state's witness. Purcell quoted the girl's statement as saying Tatum and Patrick Raymond (alias O'Day) had exchanged punches while arguing across the bar the afternoon of Jan. 14. Finally, their blows developed into a savage fight in which Raymond's aides became involved, Purcell said.

Raymond, John Snyder, 20, and Harold Sehorn, 25, are charged with murder and accused of fatally beating the Billerica, Mass., ship captain and tossing his body from a 50-foot cliff in suburban Portland.

Purcell said the girl reported Tatum was groaning while apparently unconscious on the floor and that Snyder and Sehorn carried the captain from the club.

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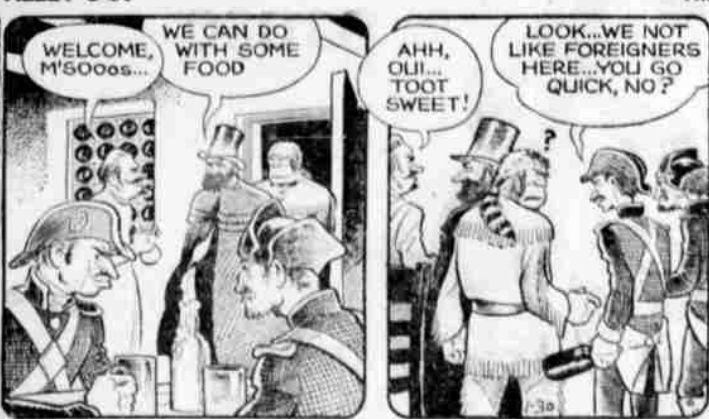
